THE LEGISLATURE AND THAT COMMISSION

The events of the week in connexion with the legislature, have been of surpassing interest. It was stated in the St. John Sun on Saturday last that a memorial bearing the signatures of the twelve opposition members and containing eighteen specific and several general charges against the government, had been lodged with the lieutenant governor and a demand had been made upon him to pass over the legislature which was then in session and appoint a special commission of judges of the supreme court to investigate the charges and pass upon the guilt or innocence of the lieutenant governor's advisers. The correspondent in communicating a statement of the charges in detail which occupied over two columns of the Sun, seemed to have obtained his information by a remarkable exhibition of skillful pumping as not one of the opposition, so he alleged, could be induced to divulge a syllable of what had taken place. They were all, from the leader down, as dumb as oysters. It now transpires that this interesting memorial had been presented to the lieut. governor by Mr. McKeown on Friday at noon and on Monday at noon the memorialists received their reply. It had been whispered about on Friday evening by a few well informed opposition gentlemen, in a mysterious manner, that a bomb shell was going to burst on the government, and Dr. Atkinson, alderman Smith, of St. John, and the gentleman who does not represent Kent - Mr. Phinney - oracularly announced that the dismissal of the ministry and a new election were more than probable in the immediate future. On Monday afternoon, as soon as the order of business in the house permitted, the attorney general laid on the table by the command, which means by the permission of the lieutenant governor, a copy of the very memorial the opposition had been at such pains to work up, together with his honor's reply. The attorney general im mediately arose, after these papers had been all read at the clerk's table, and moved a resolution reciting the presentation of the memorial to the governor and the latter's reply, and declaring it to be the duty of the twelve opposition men who had formulated the charges to the governor to forthwith ask a committee for their immediate investigation. Stockton wriggled and squirmed to get out of First he took the point of order that Mr. Blair's resolution could not be moved except on two days notice, but the speaker ruled, charges reflecting on the integrity of the members of the government should, under our parliamentary practice, be disposed of at once, if the parties charged desired. Then Stockton contended that the attorney general's resolution interfered with the prerogative in proposing that the members should pledge themselves to stay all summer, if need be, to afford the opposition an opportunity of exhaustively investigating each and all of their accusations. This point of order did not hold water any better than its predecessor, so the only thing remaining for the utterly shattered remnants of a once confident party, was to stand up and vote against an enquiry into their own charges. On this vote the

There never was such a pitiful spectacle in the legislative history of this or any other country as that Mr. Stockton and his six associates presented on this memorable afternoon. On Monday morn they beamed with hope and confident expectation. The governor it is true, thought they, has not replied, but no doubt he is deeply impressed by the representations of the memoralists and will be slow to refuse a demand backed by so formidable an indorsement and with the policy of the Ottawa government. No approval of high constitutional authority such as Drs. Stockton, Alward and Mr. McKeown. But alas! at dewy eve, all their high hopes had fled and nothing remained but black despair. Figuratively speaking these moral and constitutional giants of the morning are in the evening lying bleeding, torn and bedraggled, the picture of agony and despair, each one trying to unload the blame of his lost condition on some one else, but all asserting that they did not know what was in the paper. 
