A Disastrous Gyolone

One of the greatest disasters of recent years overwhelmed the city of St. Louis, Missouri, Wednesday night last, in the shape of a cyclone, which began shortly after five o'clock, and for over thirty minutes tore its awfel thirty minutes tore its awful way through the city with a velocity of over eighty miles an hour. Reports from there were at the time very meagre, owing to the almost total destruction of the telegraph wires. The city hospital, which fortunately survived the storm, was filled to overflowing with mangled men, women and children, and the morgue within two hours after the end of the storm was so full of corpses that it was necessary to provide other quarchallenged the qualification of nine jurors before the court to-day. Scores of dead have been identified, but no one is willing to venture a guess as to how many bedies may be in the ruins of the

is willing to venture a guess as to how many bedies may be in the ruins of the hundreds of buildings as yet unexplor-ed. The total number of dead in St. Louis, identified up to to-night, is 162. Louis, identified up to to-night, is 162, and in East St. Louis 127. In St. Louis there are 22 bodies unidentified and in East St. Louis two. It is believed that the death of the injured and the future recovery of bodies will bring the St. Louis death rate well up to 200. In East St. Louis the city officials death clare this evening that they have hope that the death roll on that side of the river will not exceed 150, but the ruins upon which the rescuers have not yet river will not exceed 150, but the ruins upon which the rescuers have not yet begun to work may swell the total far beyond that figure. The estimates upon property loss have grown wider and further apart.
