LATEST War News

LONDON, Nov. 17. The Telegraph's Uskub correspondent under Thursday's date, says: "The Crown Prince, who left here yesterday to join the Serbian Army before Monastir, arrived at Perlepe this afternoon. He received an enthusiastic welcome from the inhabitants who strewed the roads with flowers. While the reception was in progress, the sound of guns, about 25 miles south west, announced that the battle of Monastir had begun. All the news, thus far received here, is that the Serbian cavalry division, operating between Perlepe and Monastir, came in contact with a Turkish column consisting of a regiment of infantry, cavalry and a battery at once attacked the enemy near the village of Dobroviz. Despite the fire from the Turkish guns, the Serbians forced the column, which formed the advance guard, to retire, by a successful flank movement, and it fell towards Novatz, away from its main body."

A Great Battle Being Waged

Special to Evening Telegram. CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. A great battle between the Bulgarians and Turks is on along the line of the Tchatalja fortifications. Nazim Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief sends the following dispatch: "The battle which commenced on Sunday morning with an attack by the Bulgarian infantry lasted until an hour after sunset. The enemy who advanced chiefly facing our right wing and our center were repulsed by our infantry and artillery fire. Three Bulgarian batteries were destroyed." All through the day the sound of heavy guns booming distantly was heard at Constantinople. It ceased only with darkness. The firing along the entire line was evidently preparatory to an infantry attack. Nazim Pasha's headquarters are near Hademken railway station. According to the latest reports, the battle ceased with night-fall. The resumption of hostilities is not regarded as indicating the collapse of peace negotiations but rather as a means of hastening Turkey's acceptance of the allies' terms by proving her complete helplessness or as one correspondent phrased it: "To establish an accomplished fact before making further communications." The Bulgarian Government organ, Mir, reverses to the subject of peace and plainly intimates that the allies are prepared to consider the question of an alliance with Turkey, provided the latter promptly accepts the terms, which would give Turkey an opportunity of welding the territories into a modern state and making friends with conquerors. The Balkan States clearly have in mind the formation of such an alliance as would be able to defy European interference in the disposition of the spoils of war.

Cholera Raging.

Death Rate fifty per cent Army Refugees.

Special to Evening Telegram. CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day. There are now over a thousand cases Cholera daily in and in front of Constantinople. The death rate has reached fifty per cent army refugees. The authorities are unable to cope with the situation. On Thursday last 3000 Cholera patients arrived by train at San Stephano. They would have been brought here, but for the protests of railway companies and the Austrian Ambassador.

Armistice Off

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Negotiations for an armistice have failed and the Bulgarians yesterday opened the attack against the Turks all along the line. A heavy artillery duel continued throughout the day. The Bulgarians made preparation for an infantry attack. The Turkish fleet participated vigorously in the defense at the Marone end of the lines and presumably the Turkish warships assisted at the Black Sea end also.

German Budget.

Naval and Military Increases.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, To-day. Some leading items of the Budget of the German Empire for the coming year are given in the Boer Courrier, the leading financial daily. The total income are balanced at approximately \$762,000,000 each showing an increase of about \$74,000,000 over that of last year. The Estimate for Navy is given at \$119,250,000, an increase of \$1,500,000. Ordinary Naval expenditure increases four million, non recurring expenditure by \$5,250,000, but extraordinary expenditure of Navy is reduced by \$7,750,000, owing to approaching completion of Naval construction program. Naval estimates include the appropriation of five million for submarines. The army estimates increase is \$14,250,000 which includes increases of forces provided for in new military bill, one of which is the organization of ninety three machine gun companies.

Anniversary Service

OF C. L. B.
As a finale to the celebration of their anniversary, which occurred on Wednesday last, the members and ex-members of the Church Lads Brigade attending morning and afternoon services at the Church of England Cathedral yesterday at 8.30 a.m. they attended Holy Communion at which the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland officiated. In the afternoon the battalion formed up at their armory on Harvey Road, and marched to the Cathedral, by way of Long's Hill. His Lordship Bishop Jones delivered an impressive sermon, taking as his text, "Faith, Hope and Charity" from 1st Corinthians, 13th chapter, 13th verse. The preacher explained the meaning of the words thoroughly and was listened to with rapt attention. The Bishop gave a general review of the Brigade's history. He contrasted the quarters it had when formed with its spacious armory of to-day. He referred to the friendly relationship existing between the different brigades and hoped it would continue. After the service the battalion reformed ranks and returned to their armory where Lt.-Col. Resdall addressed the lads and congratulated all on the excellent turnout, particularly the ex-members. He referred to the progress of the Brigade Club yet in its infancy, being established last year. He then presented Mr. N. Show, late Captain and Bandmaster of the battalion with an illuminated address and a silver tea service, as a mark of appreciation of his valuable services. The recipient made a fitting reply and expressed appreciation of the recognition of his work. The National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.
