Craft in Collision

The Prospero brought word that week ago a Harbor Main schooner. Spracklin, master, bound to Griffin's Harbor, Labrador, laden with sup-plies, put into Conche in a badly wrecked condition. While going wrecked condition. While going through the Straits of Belle Isle dense fog was met and when about thirty miles from the land, the vessel struck an iceberg. The craft was injured and started to leak fast and the forty persons on board thought they would meet watery graves.
