90 IMPRISONED SAILORS RESCUED

LONDON, To-Day. An armored car section under the command of the Duke of Westminster played a leading part in the defeat and dispersal of the tribesmen under comnand of Turkish officers on the western front of Egypt by forces under command of Major General Peton. Af-ter an aeroplane reconnaisance had disclosed that Eirar had been evacuated, the motorists were ordered to push forward with reasonable boldness. Ignoring the armed bedouins, who were proceeding westward, the motorists dashed to the enemy's camp, motorists dashed to the enemy s.camb, 25 miles west of Sollum, says the official report issued last night on the progress of the campaign, shooting down the gun servers and scattering hostile forces. Ninety shipwrecked sailors who had landed on the Cytenaica coast and had been seized by the Senussi were rescued. The report concludes that in three weeks the force under Major General Peton has cap-tured the hostile commander, killed or captured about fifty per cent. of the Turkish subordinate commanders, Turkish subordinate commanders, driven and scattered the remnants of his force far beyond the enemy border and taken all his artillery and

ATTACKED FRONTIER VILLAGES.

LONDON, To-day. 
