Painleve declared the new Ministry should not be representative of political parties, but a Government of National Unity, bending all the strength of the nation to an increasingly energetic conduct

In announcing his decision to give his effort from the Cabinet, M. Ribot sketched briefly the program he had formulated for the guidance of himself and his colleagues whom he had expected to have with him. Of special interest this time is the notorious disclosures in the Dural case, as a result of which Minister of Interior Malvy recently resigned, was Ribot's decision to apply as rapidly as possible legal measures to all the criminal acts which are being investigated, neglecting nothing to discover the authors of moves against national defence and being restrained by no considerations for anyone. His program also comprised a more energetic conduct of the war and extension of liberty, on condition that its exercise be not confounded with criminal propaganda.


