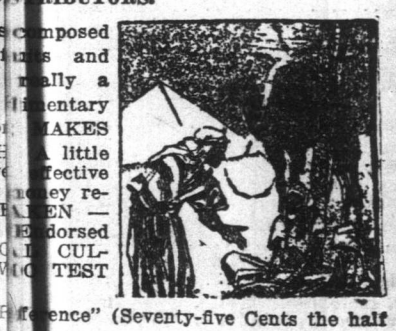

FIGHTING IN ALBANIA.

ROME, To-day.
(Official.) Enemy parties have been
repulsed in the Poena Valley. As a
result of a raid, east of Zecchi, the
French took 15 prisoners. In Albania,
Wednesday, enemy columns twice
stormed with great violence our position
from Ardineca to the north of the
Lower Semeti. Both times they were
repulsed. The same day
the column crossing the Semeti to the
east of Kuci, made our advanced post
retire. A counter attack, Thursday,
drove the enemy to the river.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, To-day.
South of the Ourcq there has been
reciprocal artillery activity, without
infantry actions. On the north bank
of the Marne we captured, at the
close of the day yesterday, Reuil and
Savignies. From Reuil we pushed
back the enemy to the southern out-
skirts of the Villages Pinson, Or-
igny and Valler-Sous-Chailion.
The total number of prisoners cap-
tured on the 25th at Villeneuve and
the region of Oulchy le Chateau was
700. On the Champagne front, our
troops after having broken the Ger-
man offensive on the 15th and 16th,
have carried out during the following
days a series of local attacks. In
spite of the enemy's resistance, we
have made, to the east of the Suippe,
an advance of about 1500 meters to
the general line of St. Hilaire Grand
Souain and Lemois les Hurleux. We
have reconquered entirely Main de
Dennasse and re-occupied in this
region our former first line. During
these operations we have taken 1,100
prisoners, 200 machine guns and sev-
eral guns.

AVIATION REPORT.

PARIS, To-day.
On the 25th our aviators brought
down, or forced to land, seven hostile
machines. Eighteen were brought
down by British aviators working in
conjunction with us. On our part we
dropped more than 38 tons bombs,
during the day and night, on stations,
railway communications, depots, mu-
nition depots and military parks in
the rear of the battle zone. Fires and
explosions were observed. British
bombing aviators also have car-
ried out many expeditions and have
dropped four tons of bombs on Bazoches,
Pere-en-Tardenois and Monts Notre
Dame. Army of the East.—The ene-
my has attempted several local at-
tacks to the west of Lake Doiran, and
between Lake Presba and Ochrida, in
which they were repulsed with
serious losses. While the enemy has
not been able to reach our lines in
Albania, we are organizing our con-
quered positions. The prisoners
taken in this sector since July 21st
are 700, including 25 officers. Allied
aviators have carried out numerous
bombardments. One enemy machine
has been brought down.

A NEW DISCOVERY.

PARIS, To-day.
The number of German prisoners
captured by the Allies, since the be-
ginning of the counter offensive, is
placed at 30,000 by the Havas Agency.
American troops have discovered at
Brecy, north of Chateau Thierry, em-
placements of the German super-can-
non which bombarded towns behind
the front, and perhaps Paris.

A NEW KING.

PARIS, To-day.
The Crown of Finland has been of-
fered to Duke Adolph Frederick of
Mecklenburg Schwerin, and he has
accepted, says a Zurich despatch to le
Journal. The offer was made by the
delegation from Finland Landtag.

WORK OR FIGHT.

LONDON, To-day.
The announcement last night of Pre-
mier Lloyd George, that all workmen
absent from factories after Monday,
will be deemed to be deserters, has
placed themselves outside the munici-
pal industry and that they will be-
come liable to military service, was
issued too late to make any difference
to the strikers last night. Consequently
it was not generally known in the
strike areas. It was, however, com-
municated to the strikers at some
centres by newspapermen, to whom
the leaders declared they were con-
fident that the strikers would not be
intimidated or driven to resume
work by the Government's threat. The
leaders added that such a possibility
had been considered fully by the
Government and that they were con-

FRENCH ADVANCES.

PARIS, To-day.
(Bellet.) Further advances were
secured by the French in the region
immediately to the north of the Marne,
in the district where the Germans
have been clinging to the river. The
war office announced to-day that the
French lines were advanced to the
north of Pont St. Esprit, and that the
French had been driving the Germans
nearly two-thirds of a mile on a front
of approximately two miles. The
French took two hundred prisoners in
this operation.

Department of Natural Resources.

Opened by President Reid, of the
Reid Nfld. Co. Will Develop Coal
and Other Mineral Areas.

A movement, that if successful,
means the dawn of a better day for
this country has been inaugurated by
H. D. Reid, Esq., President of the Reid
Nfld. Co., who has started, in connec-
tion with the railway business of this
country, a Department of Natural Re-
sources and in order to get the best
results in the quickest possible time
the services of a mining engineer with
the work have been secured.
The chief of the department is Mr.
J. W. Korbes, son of the late Dr.
Forbes, Bonaville, a graduate of the
Gill school of mining, and a specialist
in hydraulic engineering. His asso-
ciates are Messrs. H. H. Hatcher and
Hatcher and Dr. Mook, both gradu-
ates of the Columbia University,
New York. Prof. Hatcher was for
many years connected with the
concerns at a specialist at the great
Cobalt Mines, while Dr. Mook has had
similar experience in the United
States. In addition to the above a
staff of miners and prospectors will
be engaged.

The idea is to thoroughly and sys-
tematically survey and explore the
land owned by the Company along the
line of railway and ascertain its min-
eral resources. Scientific research will
be commenced very shortly and it is
hoped that in four or five years the
every block of land owned by the Com-
pany on both sides of the railway will
be surveyed. Should minerals be dis-
covered, it is the intention of the
Company to dispose of them to other
concerns for development and to fur-
ther extend their railway to the
scene of operations. This rule, how-
ever, does not apply to the develop-
ing of the large coal areas now owned
by the Company which they intend op-
erating as a public utility. Operations
which were commenced some
time ago on block 7 where 800 feet of
surface coal had been laid bare will
be resumed in the quickest possible
time. Several other kinds of valuable
minerals have already been discover-
ed and are now in the hands of Mr.
Davies, Government Analyst. Locat-
ing suitable farming sites will be one
of the chief features of the work and
when a suitable site is discovered it
will be laid out in blocks and a log
house erected on each for the benefit
of intending settlers.

After the war there will be a great
influx of immigrants to this side of
the Atlantic, and the desire of Presi-
dent Reid and his associates is that
our Dominion will be in a position to
offer inducements equal to those of
Canada. The President of the Reid
Co., who, we understand, has been
working on the plan for many months
having studied closely the wonderful
work done by the C.P.R. in that direc-
tion, is sparing no pains to have the
great work accomplished. Mr. J. P.
Powell, General Supt. of the Co., will
be also directly connected with the
department, and will pay special at-
tention to the extending of the rail-
way to the parts of the country to be

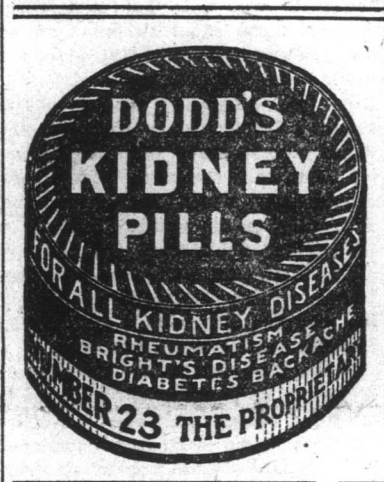
