S. G. Collier—Carriage Builder and Undertaker. For a number of years a member of the City Council.

Jas. F. Wiseman—Grocer. Owner of the Broadway Stores on the higher levels.

J. J. Nangle—Contractor. Owner of grocery and fruit business.

Thos. Peel—Retired dry goods dealer. A member of the Citizens' Committee in connection with the Civic Charter.

Denis Galway—Tailor and Clothier. Owner of a Water Street establishment.

C. F. Garland—Printer and book-binder by trade. Lieut. Royal N.F. Regiment. Veteran of the Great War.

Jas. T. Marsh—Undertaker. Was on several occasions elected as member of the City Council.

Friendly to the Stranger.

LITTLE GIRL EATS AMERICAN CHOCOLATE FOR FIRST TIME.

ASTRAKHAN, Nov. 10.—(By a Staff Correspondent of The Associated Press.)—Friendliness to the stranger, especially the American, is the dominant note the traveller finds in passing here. Both the Reds and the Whites, possessed of the hospitable "wide nature" of the Russian, forget their own miseries long enough to oblige the stranger. In Astrakhan, the correspondent was taken at face value. There was no summoning before the "Cheka," or police, to examine his papers. On the contrary, a "Cheka" agent made sure that passage was available on an up-river steamer. The chief steward of the steamer, who carried on a brisk business selling soups and sandwiches to the peasant passengers, turned his kitchen inside out in his alacrity to provide meals for the stranger. "I haven't had a foreigner for a passenger since the war began," he said. The gift of a

bar of American chocolate to a little girl trotting about the spacious upper deck of the steamer brought an invitation from her Tartar parents to the "Amerikanski" to leave the vessel at Tashkizyn and travel east some 30 miles to visit the town of Tashkizyn, on the site of Sardi, the ancient capital

of the Golden Horde, where, it was stated, are still Mongol descendants of the Khans who dominated the lower Volga from the 15th to the 18th centuries. They were seriously disappointed that the invitation couldn't be accepted by the man who had given their girl a bit of chocolate. "It's the first she has ever eaten," they explained. "It hasn't been on the market for years."
