- PLAYGROUND DEVELOPMENT.**
1. Health—By providing natural spontaneous outdoor play.
  2. Physical Efficiency—By promoting full development of the vital organs and exercising all the larger muscles through play.
  3. Morality—By strengthening will power through developing character building activities.
  4. Initiative—By giving the child an opportunity to express himself.
  5. Self-Confidence—By giving constant experience in effective action.
  6. Co-Operation—By having them work together in groups under their chosen leader.
  7. Obedience—By showing the necessity of leadership.
  8. Justice—By giving daily experience of both sides of a situation.
  9. Happiness—By providing an outlet for the play instinct in every child.
  10. Citizenship—By developing thorough participation and co-operation, a sense of responsibility to the group.

### PLAYGROUNDS DIMINISH.

1. Idleness—By calling to the child in every minute of leisure time.
  2. Temptation—By training energies into proper channels and making wholesome activities more attractive than less desirable ones.
  3. Exclusiveness—By giving each his part in the game and emphasizing team play.
  4. Social Barriers—By mixing all groups.
  5. Selfishness—By teaching the child team work.
  6. Gang Spirit—By turning that instinct in the right direction.
  7. Rowdiness—By substituting real conflicts for bluff.
  8. Unfairness—By teaching true sportsmanship.
  9. Delinquency—By satisfying the boys normal craving for excitement in a wholesome way.
  10. Reformatories, and Court Cases—By filling leisure time with desirable activities.

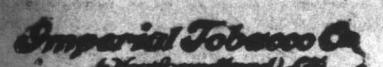
