

Supreme Court

(Before Mr. Justice Kent.)
The matter of Thomas Squires, charged with the unlawful disposition of the body of a child of his daughter, was heard at 10.30 a.m. before the following special jury: Phil Penney, John Howlett, George George, William Thompson, Arthur Samuel, Colish, Charles W. Robert, William Grey, William Har- Robert Pasch, Robert W. Ritchey. Mr. C. E. Hunt opened the case for the Crown and called Samuel Day, witness told of going to Squires' house on Jan. 1st and asked him to bury himself of rumours about his daughter. Witness was called again on Jan. 8th by Thomas Squires, when he made a confession stating that he was the father of the child and that he buried the body.
Cross-examined by Mr. King, witness said Thomas Squires gave no reason for burying the child without reporting the matter. The first time the witness saw the body was when Const. McMurdo made the arrest of the parties. His own knowledge witness did not know who was the mother of the child. Witness, who is a church warden and a member of the school board, thought it was his duty to report the rumours about the condition of Miss Squires that had been rife during December to her father. He was asked if he did not report the matter before January.
The second witness called was Mary Newhook, a midwife of Old Shop. She did not attend Miss Squires. On Jan. 8th Thos. Squires came to her and said his daughter had a child and the body had been hidden in a sheep pen. Witness told him the body had been buried and advised accused not to meddle with the body until some one saw it. Witness went to the Squires home that afternoon and told Thomas Squires saying that it was morning that he had heard his daughter was confined. Later she said he confessed that he had told a friend of the birth. He told a friend to add the body and afterwards under the floor of a sheep house. Witness went to the sheep house and saw the body. There were no marks on the body and it was put in a box brought to Mr. Squires' house.
Cross-examined by Mr. King, witness said Thomas Squires at first told her that his daughter hid the body of the child. She did not know who hid the body, and he gave witness no name for hiding the body without reporting it. Witness said there was no mark on the body or clothing to show whose child it was.
Mr. Anderson, who held the post mortem, and Const. Pittman were the witnesses called. The latter gave evidence of statement made by Thomas Squires admitting his knowledge to the transaction.
Mr. King for the defence occupied an hour in his address to the jury and asked for a dismissal of the case on the grounds of lack of evidence.

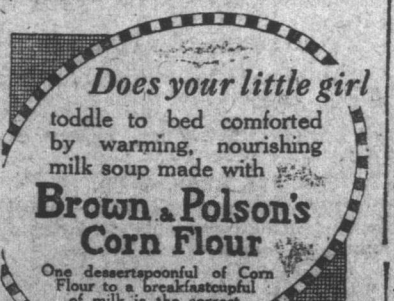
