# GRAND TRUNK SHOPS AGREEMENT Beef, Iron and Wine AN AWFUL CRASH!

Terrible Collision on the "Big Four" Railway.

Person on Either Train Escaped Injury.

Five Dead Bodies Taken from the Wreck-A Number of the Injured Cannot Live.

CLEVELAND, O., May 15.—In the midst of a terrible storm of wind and rain two Big Four trains (a passenger and a freight) crashed into each other near Cleves, Ohio, this morning with awful effect, the full horrors of which are not yet known.

Both locomotives were shattered into a strength of the track

Both locomotives were shattered into a shapeless mass and rolled off the track. The cars behind were smashed into kindling and the track for 100 feet was torn up. Many of the wounded were taken away, and the number cannot to night be definitely known. Not a person on either train excessed uniqueses. scaped uninjured.

Up to 6 o'clock five bodies had been recovered. Under the freight engine were found Engineer Wm. Sidds and his fireman, Hiram Bruce, both of Indianapolis. Under a mashed car further back Philip Gibbon and David Harwood were found. The fith body was that of Berry Edwards, engineer of the passenger train. engineer of the passenger train. THE INJURED.

Fireman Henry Tyrel jumped before the crash, but was caught under the mass of wreckage. He cannot survive.
