MAXIM'S GUN IS A GO. Portsmouth, Eng., Nov. 28.—Hiram Maxim's new quick-firing gun was tried with remarkable results. With 25 pounds of cordite, it showed an effective range of 16,000 yards.

AUSTRALASIA'S WHEAT SURPLUS. Sydney, N. S. W., Nov. 28.—An unofficial estimate places the wheat yield of New South Wales at 11,000,000 bushels, and it is anticipated that the probable surplus of wheat from Australasia will be 6,000 bushels.

MARK TWAIN ASSAILED. Berlin, Nov. 28.—A private dispatch received from Vienna says that Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain), while being forcibly ejected from the lower house of the Reichsrath Friday, was struck a severe blow by a Czech delegate.

GERMANY MUST EVACUATE. London, Nov. 28.—The Chinese government has refused to accept the demands relative to the murder of missionaries that Kiaoh Chou Bay must be evacuated before the demands can be discussed. Baron Von Hülshoff refused to consent to this, and a deadlock was the result.

THE EDUCATION TEST. Sydney, N. S. W., Nov. 28.—The committee of the legislative assembly has passed the bills extending the Chinese restriction act to "other colored people, except British subjects," and restricting immigration by an educational test.

LABOUCHERE WINS. London, Nov. 28.—The application of Henry Labouchere, the editor of Truth, to restrain Henry Hess, editor of the African, from publishing letters which Mr. Labouchere wrote to the late George Augustus Sala, and which Mr. Hess represented to be evidence of the stock jobbing transactions of the late George Augustus Sala, was granted by the courts Saturday, the injunction also inflicting costs against Mr. Hess.

NO FIGHTING. London, Nov. 28.—A dispatch from London says that the British and French troops near Nikki in Siam have been ordered to withdraw without any trouble. A Paris dispatch says: "Mr. Lebon, minister of the colonies, has received a cable dispatch, denying that there has been any fighting between the French and British forces at or near Nikki, in Siam, and that the French have been ordered to withdraw without any trouble."

The impressive service was choral. Amidst the ringing of bells and strains of the "Wedding March" from the organ, Lord Mount-Stephen, attended by Sir John McNeill, took his place at the altar railings. The bride, leaning on the arm of her uncle, Mr. Tuinell, passed up the aisle and took her place. She was attended by four pretty little girl relatives, beautifully attired. Then the service commenced. There were noticed among the guests: Field Marshal Viscount Wolseley, Field Marshal Sir Donald Stewart, Admiral Lord Clan-William, Sir Stafford and Lady Northcote, Mr. T. known ex-baseball player, is an employee at the asylum. The father of the deceased, the late Wm. Dunn, was employed at the city gas works for 25 years, and died about five months ago, and his mother about four years ago. Messrs. James Dunn, of Talbot street, and Harry Dunn, of Ridout street, are uncles of deceased. Mr. Steve Dunn left this morning for the scene of the accident.

CHIEF LAST MESSAGE.
Conductor Dunn's note-book reveals the fact that he was conscious for some time after the accident. Probably his last conscious act was an effort to do something that would throw light on the catastrophe by writing what he could about it. He succeeded in stating that they had been in the tunnel at the time of writing an hour and twenty minutes.

Terrible Catastrophe

Caused by Coal Gas in the St. Clair Tunnel.

Three Men Suffocated and Six More Unconscious.

Train Broke in Two—Rescuers Risk Their Lives to Save Their Comrades—Accident Caused by the Collapse of a Coupling Pin.

Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 28.—A train breaking in two when attempting to pass through the tunnel was the cause of an awful casualty last night. Three men are dead and six unconscious as the result of inhaling the deadly coal gas.

THE DEAD.
The dead are Henry J. Courtney, engineer; Arthur Dunn, conductor (brother of Steve Dunn, of London, Ont.); John Dalton, brakeman. All were of the crew of tunnel engine 599.

THE INJURED.
The injured are William Dunn, fireman; William Porter, brakeman. Both men had died. They lay behind the engine, unconscious, but are expected to recover.

Other unconscious persons are J. Haley, track walker; Thomas Hartigan, Samuel Mann, Peter May, who had gone down as a volunteer rescue crew.

William Cuttiffe, Pat Gore and Jos. Brady, of the rescuers, succeeded in gaining the open air, but much overcome by the gas.

THE CAUSE.
The accident was caused by the breaking of a coupling-pin. At 7:34 a train of 26 cars loaded with perishable freight started through the tunnel from this side with the crew first named in charge. When part-way through the train broke in two and the engine emerged at the Canadian side with only one car. The engine at once returned to gather up the remainder of the train, and for nearly two hours nothing was heard of them. Finally a searching party was sent out from the Canadian side, and Engineer Courtney, and Fireman Porter, and Fireman Duncan and Brakeman Dalton could not be found at that time.

After becoming attached thereto, the engine stalled, owing to the steep grade, and the fireman went back to cut off a portion of the train. The signal was then given for the rear train, but no answer was received and while on the hunt for them the others were overcome.

NARROW ESCAPE OF THE SEARCHERS.
The searching party that started out from this side also had a narrow escape from asphyxiation. After going into the tunnel some distance they were compelled to turn back. Three of them succeeded in gaining the American portal, but Hartigan, Mann and May were overcome.

OVERCOME AND DROPPED DOWN.
They were later brought out by another searching party, and both are believed now to be out of danger.

The gas in the tunnel arises from the hard coal used as fuel by the engines.

Courtney resided in this city, is a widower, and is survived by a 12-year-old daughter. Dunn and Dalton reside at Sarnia, and are both married men.

THE DEAD CONDUCTOR.
Arthur Dunn, the conductor of the fated train, was an old London boy, and had a host of friends here who will hear of the terrible accident with deep sorrow. He had been employed on the G. T. R. for the past 8 or 9 years, and was at one time one of the globe special crew. He had been living at Sarnia for the past seven years, and for about a year before going there lived at Niagara. Before entering the service of the railroad company he learned the trade of machine carpenter with Mr. Darville, of this city. While there he was a very successful athlete, being a well known baseball and hockey player.

He was 28 years of age, and two years ago married Miss H. McDonald, of Sarnia, who, with one child, a little girl, survive him.

Several relatives of the deceased conductor reside in the city, and in their sad bereavement will have the keen sympathy of the entire community.
