It was indeed a braw day for the Scotchmen of London yesterday. They invited the whole city down to Fort Stanley to enjoy their annual picnic, and judging by the appearance of both places; everybody went. Seldom has Port Stanley been so full; seldom has London been so empty. A funeral gloom reigned over the city and the streets were comparatively descreted. Nearly all the stores (pursuant to the new agreement) put up shutters at 1 p.m., and of course the picnic benefited thereby, and so did the clerks, grateful for the half-holiday.

Shades of a hot day, what a crowd! It even beat the record of Port Stanley traffic established by the Scotchmen last year, which was some 3,200 tickets. The high-water mark of 4,000 seems to have been reached yesterday. Four big trains, all crowded, left at 9, 9:30, 10 and 10:30 o'clock in the morning. In the afternoon it was found one train would not be enough, and an additional one had to be made up on the spot, and followed the regular about 3 o'clock. It was no easy matter to transport such a multitude, but the M. C. R. did its best. The coaches were first-class, and there was pienty of them.
