WINDY—SOME SHOWERS.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 6-11 p.m.—

The storm started over the Middle Mississippi Valley yesterday is tonight central over Northern Michigan. It is causing fresh gales on the lakes, more particularly west of Lake Ontario. It now shows signs of dispersal. There is a slight decrease of pressure setting over the eastern Provinces and a slight increase in the northwest.

—Miss Daisy Acheson, of Menford, is visiting her uncle, W. T. Vanston this city.

—Dr. McNeil (of St. John's) and wife have returned from their honeymoon at Chicago.

—Rev. Robert Aylward, city, will preach in the Presbyterian Church, Petrolia, tomorrow.

—Bishop O'Connor, city, will conduct confirmation at La Salette, Essex county, next Thursday.

—The pulpit of the First Congregational Church will be occupied to-morrow by Rev. Dr. Wild, of Toronto.

—There are at present confined in the Middlesex county jail 35 prisoners—32 men and 3 women.

—Neil Cooper yesterday disposed of the small brick house belonging to Mrs. Gollop, Colborne street north, to Mrs. Kelly for \$850.

—Mrs. Thomas Green and family, of Carleton place, have returned home from a two weeks' visit to the Chicago Fair.

—The treasurer's report, at the annual meeting of the Women's Christian Association of this city, showed receipts \$8,759.20, disbursements \$7,195.05, balance in hand \$1,564.15.

—The new Methodist Church at the Baker appointment, Westminster circuit, will be dedicated to-morrow morning.

—Rev. J. R. Gandy, of the Wellington Street Church in this city, will preach and conduct the dedication services.

—Half English arrived in town yesterday, having in charge five prisoners from the west bound for the Central Prison. At the county jail here the number was increased to eight, Norman Neil, John Connors and Wm. Brennan composing the trio from this city.

—Mr. Bart Howard, of this city, was welcomed at Woodstock Thursday night as the new Y. M. C. A. secretary there. Mr. C. R. Syer, the former secretary, presented him with a handsome chair, shaped like a Bible, on behalf of the association in this city. Mr. Howard was the ex-commander of the London Y. M. C. A. Boat Club and very popular here.

—The anniversary of the Wellington Street Methodist Sunday school takes place to-morrow, when Rev. George Richardson, of Berlin, will preach morning and evening. An open session of the school will be held at 2:30 p.m., when addresses will be given by Revs. Richardson, Clement and Philip. The annual entertainment will be given on Monday and Tuesday evenings.

—Hon. J. W. Longley, Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, and Mrs. Longley visited the asylum yesterday afternoon, and under Dr. Buckle's guidance, inspected the buildings and grounds. They were pleased with all they saw and particularly interested in the sewerage system. Subsequently Mr. and Mrs. Longley gave for their eastern home. They pronounced themselves as delighted with London, its fine buildings, shaded streets and general beauty.

He will preach in St. James' Church, South London, Sunday morning, and at the cathedral in the evening. He and Mrs. Stewart will address a meeting in the new Croydon hall on Monday at 3:30 p.m. These faithful missionaries of the cross have had long and wide experience, passed through many hardships, and have seen some bloodshed in connection with them. Their account of the work is deeply interesting. The bishop will preach in St. James' in the evening.

With the Hounds.

The London Hunt Club had a very successful run yesterday afternoon. The route chosen lay almost directly west of the kennels, and, notwithstanding the rain which fell shortly prior, was in excellent condition. The riding of Miss Gibbons, the only lady, was as usual greatly admired. Among the gentlemen noted were Messrs. George Bowman, George C. Gibbons, C. C. Major Smith, Dr. Abbott, George Nasse, George Hecker, Dr. Niven, Hugh Niven and Westcott Graydon. The Hunt have leased the Houseman property opposite Hellmuth College. The buildings, which will be utilized for kennels, are in good condition and are surrounded by 35 acres of beautiful land.

Wants the Duty Removed.

The Toronto Trader, the organ of the manufacturers, has this to say of a London firm which wants certain duties removed: "Mr. Fred T. Treblelock, manager of the Canada Smelting and Refining Company, of London, complains that the Government has not yet placed jewelers' sweeps, etc., on the free list, and that unless this is done so that his company can have the same chance to refine United States sweeps as the refiners of that country have to refine ours (as they admit them duty free), his company will have to remove their works across the line, where the bulk of their work is naturally expected to come from. In our opinion this request of Mr. Treblelock's company is well founded, and these imports should at once be placed upon the free list. Such an action on the part of the Government is distinctly in line with their expressed desire to foster and encourage all legitimate Canadian industries, and we know of no reason why this action should have been so long delayed. If the present duty is not removed, American sweeps cannot possibly be refined in Canada, and some of our citizens will lose an opportunity of turning an honest penny from work now done in the United States. As this matter cannot possibly affect the revenue one way or the other, it would seem to be wisdom on the part of the powers that be, not only to make the desired concession gracefully but to make it at once."

Corporal Punishment.

A case of insubordination on the part of a boy formerly attending Talbot street school was tried before No. 1 committee of the Education Board last evening. A letter was read from Mr. S. Turner, complaining that Principal Stewart did not properly investigate a complaint which had been laid against his son before suspending the youth. Principal Stewart explained that young Turner had fought with another boy and that when asked to take punishment had refused. A resolution was passed approving of the principal's action, and stating that the boy would be permitted to return to the school. Mr. Turner was highly incensed at this decision and insisted with a determination to apply to the board for his son's entrance into King street school. He said he would move rather than have the boy again in school. Mr. S. Turner, Principal Merchant was authorized to spend \$800 in properly equipping the Collegiate Institute library. No action was taken in regard to the suggestion of sending Inspector Chan to visit the school systems of several large cities. The solicitor will be asked to give his opinion as to the right of children in one school district to attend another; whether payment of taxes in two districts can affect the matter; and whether non-residents paying taxes can attend city schools. James Barr wrote applying for the entrance of Elizabeth Mackenzie, formerly of Kingston, into the Collegiate Institute. The secretary was instructed to inform Mr. Barr that a legal paper affirming his guardianship of the young lady would have to be presented prior to granting his request. Miss Agnes C. Brown, a student, was appointed kindergarten assistant in Queen's avenue school. Nine assistants in the Model School wanted to know how they were to be paid. A recommendation was made that they be paid out of the Model School appropriation.
