THE BODY ARRIVES HOME.

The body of the late Detective B. B.

Allan arrived in the city yesterday of the 12:30 G. T. R. accommodation train from the east. The remains were unac companied, having been shipped from Sim oce at 8:30 in the morning. A large crowd coe at \$3.30 in the morning. A large crowd had assembled at the station, among whom were Squire Edwards, of East London, father-in-law of the unfortunate man, Mr. Edwards' son, Harry Allan, the young son of Detective Allan, the young son of Detective Allan, Mr. P. McPhillips, County Constable Schram and several members of the county constabulary. The casket was inclosed in a shell, which was removed at the station. The remains were then taken to Hinton's undertaking warerooms. On the cover of the casket was a small silver plate on which were the words, "At Rest." Here the lid was removed and friends permitted to look on the remains. friends permitted to look on the remains. The forehead was covered with a bandage. The forehead was covered with a bandage. The lower and visible portion of the face was badly burned but not blackened, and was of a reddish hue. When the bandage was taken of the cause of death was very clearly shown. About an inch and a half above the right eye was a hole about the size of a Canadian cent, while the remainder of the forehead was blackened and burned—caused, no doubt, by the close range in which the fatal shot was fixed. The eyelashes and eyebrows were brined completely off, and the lide were quality as black as the forehead.


