**ON TRIAL Charged With Assaulting Robert** Devine. Evidence of the Complainant and Three Witnesses Taken - Repetition

of the Evidence in Police Court.

Police Constable Thomas Howie, was placed on trial at the courthouse this morning, before Judge Edward Elliott. After the evidence of the complainant and three witnesses had been taken the court adjourned to meet again at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Robert Devine, the complainant, repeated his evidence as given at the police court, to the effect that he was working in the north part of the city and was coming south on William street about 7:30, when the car ran off. He was in the crowd near the car when suddenly the police drew their batons, and P. C. Howie struck him over the head, causing a nasty cut and partially stunning him. The police gave no provocation whatever to cause drawing their batons. Complainant gave no provocation whatever to cause the officer to strike him. After the assault he went into a house, and had his head bathed, and then proceeded home.

To Mr. Love Mr. Devine acknowledged that he was a sympathizer with the strikers, but denied ever throwing stones at the cars. The crowd offered no violence whatever to the cars while he was there. He was on the scene al-

together about ten minutes. Wm. J. Thompson, of 502 Phillip street, who was with Devine, corroborated the evidence given by the com-

plainant in every particular. Clayton Garfat, a 15-year-old youth, living on Pall Mall street, was on the scene with his bicycle shortly after the car ran off. He saw Howie strike Devine, and the officer had then aimed a blow at his (Garfat) head, but he dodged, and it landed on his neck. Howie had then kicked his wheel, bending a number of the spokes. Witness saw no disorder beyond some laughing and

John W. Johnson, who lives at 610 Central avenue, saw the car go off the track. He heard Howie say "Get back," and saw him bring down his baton on Devine's head. He went over to Devine, took him into his house, and bathed his head. Witness said that the principal part of the crowd was made up of women and children.

Court adjourned at 1 p.m.
