## **Pushed Back** From Thabanchu

The Boers Forced to Retreat a Few Miles

In the Engagement on Monday and Tuesday-Active Movement for the Relief of Kimberley-Pole-Carew's Division Reviewed by Lord Roberts Before It Left Bloemfontein on Tuesday-Interesting Boer Correspondence Captured-Women Butchered by

The immediate objective of Lord Roberts is to establish a line of British posts from one frontier of the Free State to the other at right angles with the railway, thus preventing Boer raids southward. It is essential, therefore, that the Boers should be expelled from the rugged Thabanchu district and be forced to retire to Ladybrand. As the result of the desultory firing Monday and Tuesday the Boers were pushed back a few miles, but nothing decisive appears to have been yet attained. The Boers continue to follow their harrassing tactice. One wellhorsed commando, operating in the neighborhood of Sannas Post, interfers with the British convoys going from Bloemfontein to Thabanchu. The enemy nearly captured a convoy Tuesday, but they were driven off after a

brisk fight. GEN. DICKSON'S MISHAP. The Morning Post has the following dispatch from Winston Churchill, dat-ed Thabanchu, April 29: "When Gen. Dickson retired in the circumstances related in my last telegram, his own mess cart and the brigade water cart fell into the hands of the enemy, and his rear guard was heavily fired on. This retreat compromised Gen. Hamilton, who therefore collected his orces and fell back warily into Thabanchu after sharply checking the advancing enemy with musketry and artillery fire. Although much ammuosses were insignificant, the fighting being at great range. The result is that the Boers are willing to retreat, but it is not in the power of the present force to interfere with them or their wagons."

REVIEWED BY LORD ROBERTS. A Bloemfontein dispatch, dated Tuesday, says: "This morning Gen. Pole-Carew's division, composed of the Guards and Gen. Stevens' brigade, with several batteries of artillery, all in winter clothing, left Bloemfortein. Lord Roberts, with Lady Roberts and their daughter, reviewed the division in the market place. Later Lord Roberts, while reviewing Roberts' Horse, congratulated the men upon their bravery, spoke of the gallantry of the colonial troops and expressed the hope that he might soon review them in

In Bloemfontein, the prevailing opinion among the townspeople is that the war is not likely to last more than six weeks after the British advance

shall begin. Lord Roberts has divided the Free State south of Bloemfontein into dis-tricts. Each district is under the control of a military commissioner, who has a free hand in the administration of affairs.

Attended Tuesday's Engagement at Houtnek.

Gen. Roberts Sends a Cheering Message.

Enemy Admit Losing 12 Killed and 40 Wounded, Including Russian, French and German Members of the Foreign Legion.

London, May 3.-The war office has received the following report from Lord Roberts, under date of Bloemfontein, May 2:

"Gen. Hamilton met with considerable success yesterday, and drove the enemy out of the strong position they had taken up at Houtnek, with comparatively small loss to us. The Boers dispersed in several directions, mainly prisoners in our hands, including 1 commandant and 16 other wounded men. Gen. Hamilton is now in camp

ordered them to halt for today.

"Gen. Broadwood's brigade of cavalry arrived upon the scene in time to afford valuable assistance in threatening the enemy's rear. During the afternoon Gen. Ian Hamilton was joined by Gen. Bruce-Hamilton's brigade of infantry. ENEMY LOSE HEAVILY.

"The enemy admit having 12 killed and 40 wounded yesterday, among the former was Lieut. Gunther, a German officer belonging to the 25th Regiment, and among the latter was Maximoff, the Russian commander of the Foreign Legion. 21 out of 52 of the enemy's casualties occurred among the mem-

bers of the Legion. Two Frenchmen were among the killed. "Gen. Hamilton speaks in high terms of the good service performed by the 8th Hussars, under Col. Clowes, and made up into a regiment of lancers, which came into Gen. Broadwood's brigade and assisted in making the

Boers vacate their positions. THE COUPE DE GRACE. "The final stroke to the enemy's rout was given by the Gordons and two companies of the Shropshire Light Infantry, who cheered loudly when they got within 200 yards of the position. Kitchener's Horse is also spoken of in terms of praise."
