over the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and which

over the extreme Northwest Territories.

A Pupils' Conversation.
The initial meeting for 1894 of No. 2 com-
mittee of the Board of Education was held
last evening, with Trustees Stephenson
(chairman), Anderson and Greenlee, In-
spector Carson and Secretary McElhennan
present. Charles B. Cowan, secretary of
the Collegiate Institute Literary Society,
communicated with the committee in re-
spect to holding a conversation in the in-
stitute about Easter to raise funds to main-
tain a museum and reading room; also
asking that the board fix up in a suitable
manner for a reading room the portion now
used as lunch rooms, and to furnish the old
sixth form for a museum. The use of the
institute for the conversation was granted,
and the committee will visit the school
in respect to the requested changes.
Mr. D. McDonald, janitor of Princess
avenue school, applied for an increase of
salary, submitting a statement of the
extra work performed around the building.
All repairs were done by the applicant.
Mr. McDonald will be paid at the rate of a
ten room school from Jan. 1. The request
from City Clerk Kingston in respect
to the furnishing of estimates was read, and
the principals will be asked to furnish re-
ports of necessary repairs around the
various schools, following which the com-
mittee will make a tour of inspection.
After this is done a special meeting will be
held to prepare the estimates. Several
applications for supplies, including one for
two cupboards at King street school, were
laid over, and the committee will recom-
mend that the vacant room in Quebec
street school be furnished with seats.

THE COMING CONVENTION.

Great Gathering of Young Methodist
Church Workers

To Be Held in This City Next Month—
Over Five Hundred Delegates
Expected—Committees
Appointed.

The school room of the Dundas Street
Methodist Church was filled last evening,
when a union meeting of the young
people's societies in connection with the
various Methodist churches of London was
held. It was the regular quarterly session,
and was called for the purpose of making
arrangements for the coming provincial
convention of young workers, to be held
in this city on March 20, 21
and 22. It is already an assured fact that
this convention will not only prove one of
the greatest importance, but will be as
largely attended as any gathering ever held.
As to its success, no doubt can remain when
it is announced that Dr. Clark, known as
"Father Endeavor" Clark, the founder of
that vastly increasing young people's
society, with its million members, will ad-
dress the convention. Besides this notable
man, Dr. Schell, of Chicago, and Dr. Car-
man, of Toronto, will also be present and
aid in every possible way in making the
convention a great help to all who attend.
Delegates will come from all parts of
Ontario, and will probably number between
500 and 600.

Mr. Fowlesing was opened by the chair-
man, Mr. W. J. Wattam, of London West,
followed by Dr. Antiliff with an address of
welcome in his most pleasant style.
Rev. J. W. Annis took the subject for
an interesting address the work performed
by the societies in connection with the
church. He did not think, however, that
they were doing all that could possibly be
done, and urged strongly the necessity of
making advances in every branch.

In view of the coming convention the
duty devolved upon the union to appoint
working committees, and the following
were chosen:

Registration—Rev. S. McVitty (chair-
man), C. E. Powell, C. Cowley and E. H.
Johnston.

Decorations—The League of Queen's
Avenue and Dundas Street Center to ap-
point their own.
Reception and Social—Two members
were appointed from each church as fol-
lows: Wellington Street, Miss Gundy and
Mr. Powell; Colborne Street, Miss Mary
Knott and Mr. J. A. P. Jones; Dundas Street,
Miss Tanton and Mr. R. F. Matthews;
Queen's Avenue, Miss E. Trebilcock and
Mr. Orme; Hamilton Road, Miss Etta Wil-
son and Mr. F. Skinner; London West
Mission, Miss Nixon and Mr. E. Tollett;
Richmond Street Mission, Miss M. Harvey

Miss Kate Greenway and Mr. H. Currie;
Aikin Street, Miss Cullen and Mr. G. N.
