Drury gave an address on feeding cattle for the English market. Then came addresses by Mr. Peacock on weeds. S. J. Pettit, of South Dorchester, spoke in the interests of the Beekeepers' Association. J. A. Broderick, of St. Catharines, took for his subject the position of the farmers and fruit growers in Ontario, showing how much better it might be made. Thomas Mason read a paper on dairying and Mr. Drury, in closing the meeting, took as his subject the defects in farming, and handled it in a manner that pleased and instructed those present.



PROSPEROUS PRESBYTERIANS.

Forty-Second Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's Church.

Flourishing Condition of Affairs-The Annual Report-Recommendations Adopted-Officers Elected.

The annual meeting of the mother church of London Presbyterianism—St. Andrew's —was held last evening in the basement, with a goodly representation of members present. As usual the temporalities of this large, prosperous and influential congregation were found to be in a sound and progressive condition. The pastor, Rev. J. A. Murray, opened with prayer and Scripture. Mr. H. Rowland, chairman of the board, then took the chair, and the minutes of the last meeting, as read by the secretary-treasurer, Mr. Alex. McIntosh, were adopted.

THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The 42nd annual report was submitted by the board. Appended is a summary:

The receipts through the envelope system amounted to \$5,003 24, and the open collections to \$615 18, an average per Sunday of \$108. Compared with last year it shows a total increase of \$55 42 in the envelopes, and of \$67 74 in the open collections.

shows a total increase of \$58 42 in the envelopes, and of \$67.74 in the open collections.

Your board earnestly request that more of the members and adherents of the congregation would adopt the envelope system, and that some of those so contributing would, if possible, increase their contributions.

As there are six managers to be elected to fill the places of those retiring, the board recommends that a nominsting committee be appointed. The six managers whose term now expires are Messrs. R. A. Gray, R. A. Little, J. B. Laidlaw, J. A. Cairnoross, Geo. A. Somerville, and H. M. Rowland, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

During the year all necessary repairs have been made to the church and the manse, which are now in good condition. A new picket fence has been placed in front of the eemstery at a cost of \$75. The monuments have been properly adjusted, and the grounds well kept. But in consequence of the proximity of the cemetery to the city limits and the probability of its being brought within the corporation, persons requiring lots have gone to lether cemetries, so that the revenue derived from it is very small in comparison with the year-ly expense of keeping it in order.

The carpet in the church, which has been in use for nearly eleven years, will soon have to be replaced by a new one, and it is thought that the congregation should devise some means of meeting this expenditure without encroaching upon the ordinary revenue.

devise some means of meeting this expenditure without encroaching upon the ordinary revenue.

The board respectfully recommends:

1. That the report of the organ commit tee as published in the last annual report be adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation be hereby tendered to the committee for its diligence, and that the committee for expensibility therewith.

2. That the congregation grant our pastor a vacation of a month or six weeks each year, thus enabling the session to take steps as early as possible to provide suitable supply during his absence.

3. As it is very desirable that our choir be maintained in its present state of efficiency, and as a few of the members of the congregation have been liberally contributing to a fund for that purpose during the last two years, and, as it is thought unfair that those members should have to bear the whole burden, that the board be authorized to use a sum not exceeding \$250 for choir purposes if required.

All contributions received by envelopes for congregational purposes are acknowledged quarterly, and the contributions for the schemes of the church, by red envelopes, are acknowledged in the report of the Missionary Association.

The thanks of the congregation are due, and hereby tendered to the choir, the ushers, the flower committee of the Christian Endeavor Society and the auditors for their faithful services during the year.

Rowland, John O'Dell, S. Wright and R. A. Little. The vote was very close, only nine votes separating the highest and lowest. Messrs. Houston, Gray, Laidlaw, Somerville, Rowland and Little were the six elected.

As for the carpet the ladies were asked to devise ways and means by which the desired result may be effected.

The period of the pastor's vacation was extended to two months.

The recommendation to appropriate \$250 for choir purposes passed unanimously, Mr. Wheeler explaining its necessity. The other clauses were all carried.
