AGAINST "AMERICANISM"

Much Opposition in London to Yerkes Tramways.

London, May 4.—The Yerkes scheme for the consolidation of all the underground tube railways of London is meeting with considerable opposition. The newspapers protest against such "Americanism" and monopoly and urge Parliament not to submit thereto. The parliamentary committee of the London county council will submit its report to the council tomorrow. This report will insist upon a further investigation of the consolidation scheme, which the committee contents will raise fares and otherwise operate to the disadvantage of the traveling public.

A CHURCH DYNAMITED

Because It Started Crusade Against Policy Games.

Chicago, May 4.—The war which the negro preachers of Chicago are waging on "policy" culminated in an attempt to dynamite the Institutional Church at 3235 Dearborn street last night. A negro mass meeting to arouse public sentiment against the evils which the game is said to work among the colored population had been held in the church, and the congregation had been dismissed but a few minutes when the dynamite was exploded.

The few persons who remained in the building were not injured. The explosion broke all the windows of the church and blew a large hole in the south wall. The shock was felt several blocks away. Threats had been frequently made against the pastor, who is leading the "anti-policy" crusade.

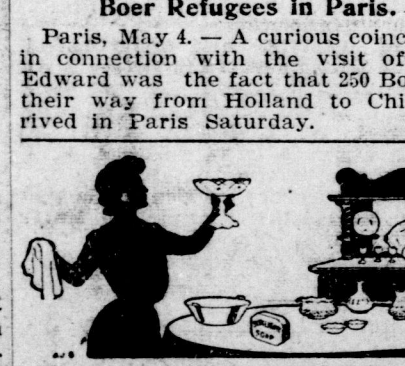

BEEKEEPERS' ASSOCIATION**ONCE MORE ACTIVE BODY**

Semi-Annual Meeting—Wintering Successful—Unfavorable Spring Weather.

While many beekeepers have already joined the association, which was only given its life in February last, it is confidently hoped that its advantages will be so strongly presented in time that none of the beekeepers in the country will continue outside the pale. PROGRAMME FOR VICE-REGAL VISIT HAS TO BE SHORTENED

Lack of Time Makes It Compulsory—\$400 To Be Asked From the Council.

One of the greatest difficulties confronting the reception committee of the city council is the limited time at its disposal in which to show the principal points of interest to Lord and Lady Minto on the occasion of their visit to London next week.

The reception committee met again on Saturday afternoon, but after an hour's planning came to the conclusion that some portion of the proposed programme would have to be eliminated. To ascertain the amount of time that would be required to go over the route, Ald. Stevenson drove over it one day during the week and he found that without allowing for any time for luncheon, it would take the vice-regal party until nearly 6 o'clock to receive the civic address of welcome, and visit St. Joseph's Hospital, the Collegiate Institute, the Sacred Heart Convent, Victoria Hospital and the Normal School, allowing that the time spent at St. Joseph's Hospital would not exceed half an hour, the same time at the Collegiate, fifteen minutes at the convent, and 45 minutes at Victoria Hospital. The mother superior at St. Joseph's is anxious to have the Governor-General visit the new wing at the hospital and declare it open, and one of the interesting items on the programme is the presentation of the diploma to the class of graduate nurses by Lady Minto. In the time allotted it is doubtful if the party could get through at

the hospitals, which added to the fear of the committee that the afternoon's proceedings might stretch into the early evening. The committee wanted to avoid this, as the Governor-General and Lady Minto are to hold the reception in the city hall in the evening, which will be very fatiguing.

Without striking some of the places from the list, the only means by which time could be saved appeared to be by the disposition of the lunch at the residence of Mayor Beck. To do this it will be necessary for arrangements to be made for Lord and Lady Minto to take lunch on the train en route from Stratford to London. If such a proposition would be favored by their excellencies the way of the reception committee will be made much easier.

Major Maude, A. D. C. to the Governor-General, has been in communication with certain members of the committee, who have ascertained that a mounted escort is required both on the arrival and departure of the party. The cost to the city from this source will be nil, unless the committee should feel disposed to grant the men a small allowance in addition to what the Government pays them.

Another most important question was also before the committee—that of the cost of the reception. Every sub-committee had prepared a list of its wants, and it was found that the total was close upon \$100, while the committee did not consider to be exorbitant. There will be much to show for the outlay. The council chamber of the city hall will receive a new carpet much needed by the way—and there will be some permanent improvements around the building, including the painting of the arcade and the decoration of the hall leading to the council chamber. It will not be an expenditure of money with nothing to show for it after the departure of the visitors.

EVANGELISTS ADDRESS VERY LARGE AUDIENCES

Immense Crowds Go to Hear Crossley and Hunter—Sunday in the Churches.

The longer Messrs. Crossley and Hunter remain in the city the greater becomes the interest in their evangelistic services, which were commenced in the Dundas Street Methodist Church a month ago. Last evening two meetings were held, and at each the attendance was very large. MR. O. B. FISH PRESENTS THE NEEDS OF THE WEST

Former Londoner Deputed by Men of Moosejaw District to Wait Upon Government.
