ENTERS NEW BUSINESS.

MUSIC AND DRAMA

AT THE GRAND TOMORROW NIGHT.

The theater-going people of London will have the pleasure of listening to a grand band concert by Italy's finest musicians tomorrow night, who will render classical music of the masters of the world, and after listening to the world's renowned organization they will be given an opportunity to hear Mascagni's masterpiece, "Cavalleria Rusticana." Think of being entertained for the first time of the evening with high class music and the latter part hearing grand opera sung by Italy's best artists.

SATURDAY'S PERFORMANCES.

Wilson Barrett's "Sign of the Cross" will be presented at the Grand next Saturday afternoon and evening. As a stage spectacle it is remarkably elaborate and beautiful. LONDON TOWNSHIP VOTERS

Court of Revision at St. John's on Saturday.

All Liberals Who Have Received Notices Should Attend It.

The court for the revision of the voters' list for the Township of London will be opened in the town hall at St. John's on Saturday, Nov. 8, at 10 o'clock in the morning. There is a large number of appeals by both Conservatives and Reformers, there being complaints by one or both parties from almost every one of the fourteen divisions in the township. Notice has been served upon everyone whose right to the franchise is to be challenged, and also upon everyone who claims the right to vote, but whose name has been in some way omitted from the list. It is accordingly very important that every Reformer who has received any such notice should attend the court at St. John's on Saturday, and otherwise he will in all probability be struck from the list or fail to have his name added thereto, as the case may be. It is possible that an election, either federal or provincial, may be held upon the list now being revised, and everyone who wishes to be in a position to vote ought to look after the matter now. It is at the court of revision that elections are won or lost, and there should be a rallying of the Township Reformers at St. John's on Saturday.

ORANGEMEN CELEBRATE

Gunpowder Plot Was Commemorated by Enjoyable Banquet.

Yesterday was the 297th anniversary of the Guy Fawkes' gunpowder plot, and the occasion was observed by local Orangemen, comprising three lodges, Boyne, No. 288; Forest City, No. 762, and Hackett, No. 805, by holding an enjoyable banquet at the Grand Central Hotel, corner of King and Ridout streets. About 125 persons were present, and although several of the principal speakers were unable to be present, the evening passed pleasantly, and the spirit of good fellowship prevailed.

Smallpox Epidemic in Port Huron.

Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 5.—Dr. Oliver, medical health officer for this place, paid an official visit to Port Huron yesterday to inquire into the smallpox epidemic reported to exist there. He ascertained that the disease existed among some twenty families, who are quarantined in their respective homes. Dr. Oliver stated that the city has no isolation hospital of means of isolating those suffering from the disease, and that vaccination is not as thoroughly enforced in Port Huron as it is in Sarnia. Dr. Oliver telegraphed the facts to Dr. Bryce, the provincial health officer.

Slowly Starved.

Montreal, Nov. 5.—Miss Virginia McBelle, who conducts a private sanitarium in this city, is charged with being criminally responsible for the death of Frederick Bell, a wealthy resident of Stanbridge, Que. Bell, who was 70 years of age, was suffering from a stomach trouble, and went to the sanitarium for treatment. Evidence showed that he had been slowly starved to death, being fed solely on water and liquid food. Doctors who made the autopsy of the body swore that the man's death was due to starvation.

Black Diamond Express on Lehigh Road Wrecked.

FIFTEEN PERSONS WERE HURT

Careless Hunters at Canifon Badly Injured—Fatal Accident at Lion's Head, Ont.

New York, Nov. 6.—The Black Diamond express of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, which left Jersey City, westward-bound, at 12:12 p.m. yesterday, was wrecked near the Jersey Meadow station east of Newark, about 12:30 p.m., and fifteen people were more or less seriously hurt, one coach and the engine being overturned. The express ran on a siding and collided with an engine standing there. The train was running at the rate of 40 miles an hour when it struck the main track of the Pennsylvania Railroad, which is used by the Lehigh Valley Railway from Jersey City to Newark.
