50 BARRELS AN HOUR

Great Record for Gurd's Oil Gusher in Raleigh District.

Chatham, Ont., Dec. 3. — Gurd's gusher was started flowing for a test on Monday morning at 8 o'clock, and is has been flowing since. At first the water and oil came in about equal quantities, but later the oil began to come more freely, until the proportions were about two-thirds to onethird water. The volume also creased and the well is now flowing with oil at the rate of about 50 barrels an hour. The oil is carried by the pipe line to Sandison Siding, and loaded in tank cars. The flow continues night and day, and by the end of the week a thorough test of the well will have been made.

Philadephia, Dec. 3. - Mrs. Kate Hassett, aged 35, leading woman in Keith's Eighth Street The ater Stock Company, was shot and killed by Barry Johnstone, a wellknown actor, formerly a member of Richard Mansfield's company and well known to theatrical people throughout the country. After the murder,

Johnstone attempted suicide. The tragedy occurred in Philadelphia's tenderloin. Johnston fired at his victim five times. Two of the bulets took effect, one in the left breast and the other in the left arm. John stone shot himself through the breast, but is expected to live.

The cause of the tragedy is believed to be jealousy. Johnstone is said to have arrived here from New York Sunday. He had Margaret Quirk, cook, Marine City, been paying considerable attention to the woman, and Monday night laid in wait for her at the stage door until
