REUNITED AFTER
FORTY YEARS

Veteran Leads to Altar Wife of His Early Days.

EACH HAD MARRIED OTHERS

Separated by Enemies, Soldier's First Spouse Had Thought Him Untrue to Her.

Toledo, O., Dec. 3.—Almost past belief is the life story of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Carl, wedded at Graytown, near Toledo, Ohio, today.

The matrimonial knot was tied by Justice Lachmiller. The contracting parties had been married 33 years ago, living together but eight months, when the husband was called to war. Since that time the now Mrs. Carl has been wedded three times and Mr. Carl twice, the latter event of each being the present nuptial occasion. The happy couple have settled down in the pretty little town of Graytown, where they have a well-furnished home.

In 1862, when Miss Mary Dugan and Walter Carl lived in Eastern Ottawa County, the former east of Port Clinton and the latter west, a friendship sprang up, resulting in their marriage May, 1862, the bride being 17 and the groom just 20. Now the same principals in a similar event are aged respectively 55 and 60.

Scarcely had the young couple been pronounced one, when the objections to the match by relatives of the groom caused trouble between the couple, and the young man went to the war.

He enlisted in the old Forty-first Regiment, one of the famous Ohio regiments in the civil war, and fought the battles of Gettysburg and Antietam. During his absence a son was born, and the proud mother, together with a loving letter, forwarded pictures of her babe and the love of her father. The delighted father immediately answered, but not hearing from his spouse, wrote again and again, and finally resorted to sending her his camp earnings. The patient wife, however, at home, with babe in her arms, heard naught from him gave up in despair.

He has since been learned that these misadventures of love and cheer had been intercepted.

Fearing the worst, Mrs. Carl obtained a divorce, and in 1866 was married to Solomon Bodt at Vienna, Mich. They lived together just a month short of 25 years, when Bodt was drowned on the Erie Superior. To them were born several children. The drowning occurred 13 years ago and in 1894, Sept. 15, Judge Millard, of Toledo, granted a license to Louis Nahn, and Mrs. Solomon Bodt, to wed.

Three years later, they were separated and Mrs. Nahn obtained a divorce.

In the meantime, after the close of the war and the home service, the country's behalf Carl returned and married Miss Caroline Florio, of Graytown. To them were born four children. This for Carl, the former Miss Florio, died four years ago.

During all this time the former wife of the soldier had hoped and dreamed of his return, and the love of his wife in words. The Carl home at Graytown is a neat and pretty one, and no child is missing or happy people live in all Ottawa County than Mr. and Mrs. Walter Carl.

The son of the early day marriage now resides in Toledo.

50 BARRELS AN HOUR

Great Record for Gurd's Oil Gusher in Raleigh District.

Chatham, Ont., Dec. 3.—Gurd's gusher was started flowing for a test on Monday morning at 8 o'clock, and has been running ever since. At first the water and oil came in equal quantities, but later the oil began to come more freely, until the proportion was about two-thirds to one-third water. The volume also increased and the well is now flowing with oil at the rate of about 50 barrels an hour. The oil is being pumped by the line to Sandison Sliding, loaded in tank cars. The flow continued night and day, and by the end of the week a thorough test of the well will have been made. The owners are delighted with the evidence the well is giving of its great resources.

Sad Death at Woodstock.

Woodstock, Dec. 2.—Miss Verona Sutherland, daughter of Mr. James Sutherland, who is employed by the Massey-Harris Company, of Toronto, died suddenly Sunday morning from the effects of a heart attack.

She was 20 years of age, and was a devoted student. Miss Sutherland was in the night with a severe toothache, and took the laudanum to ease the pain. She took too much and never regained consciousness. The coroner deemed an inquest unnecessary.

The Canteen Question.

Washington, Dec. 2.—One of the most interesting features of United States Secretary of War Root's report deals with the militia system of the country. Regarding the much-mooted canteen, Secretary Root says: "I am convinced that the general effect of prohibiting the use of beer and light wines within the limited area of the army post is to lead the enlisted men to go out of the post, to the neighborhood, to drink bad whiskey to excess, and to associate intimately with women; and that the operation of law is to increase drunkenness, disease and desertion, and moral and physical degeneration."

The new combination is said to be backed by the leading financiers of the United States, and is expected to be a powerful competitor of the Philadelphia capitalists. According to its projectors it will be operated independently of the company now controlling a majority of the rubber factories.
