To Light Tunnels.

Phosphorescent tunnels and stations
are now suggested for insuring public
safety in the Paris tube. A company
has offered to paint luminous bands on
the walls, on exit doors, etc., which
would obviate all danger from the sud-
den extinguishing of the electric, petro-
leum or other lamps in case of fire or
any other accident. The phosphores-
cence is produced by a coating of cal-
cium monophosphate, obtained by mixing
sulphur and oyster shells or calcium
cuttlefish bones, and therefore costing
very little. Besides lighting tunnels and
stations sufficiently for emergency, the
phosphorescent paint could be used for
inscriptions by engraving the latter on
glass, and filling the lines of the letters
with the calcium monophosphate. Thus
indications, as "This way out," would
become luminous in the event of failure
of the ordinary lights. The paint remains
phosphorescent for a considerable time,
as oxidation, transforming the substance
into non-luminous sulphate of lime, only
sets in very gradually.—N. Y. Commer-
cial Advertiser.
