DOCKSTADER'S MINSTRELS.

Bigger, greater,
grandier and more

edians. The leading comedian, always
excepting Mr. Dockstader, is of course
Mr. O'Brien, who has been a part of
the Dockstader show since he was a
burnt cork was invented. O'Brien is a
natural and legitimate comedian. In
the person of Al Johnson Dockstader
has acquired an artist who presses
him and O'Brien closely for the hon-
ors. Good old, portly Eddie Mazzer
makes a tremendous hit with his "Hot

fresh from the factory. Johnnie Dove

The singing section of the show is
strong. There is a splendid chorus
and an entirely new order of stage
grouping and effects. Rees V. Pros-
er makes the greatest individual
song hit. At the end of the first part
Dockstader and Johnson partake of a
Welsh rabbit, and their subsequent
dream is strangely interwoven in their
trip to the pole. The third part is
under personal charge of Neil O'Brien,
who is a scream. There is interpolated
the song "When Matilda Sings." It
is sung by Johnny Dove, assisted by
sixteen dancers including Tommy
Hyde in a solo dance. Al Johnson holds

CORPUS CHRISTI IN CATHOLIC CHURCH

AN IMPRESSIVE SCENE

preached a special sermon, taking as
his theme the festival of Corpus
Christi.

First Communion.

A class of seventy-one little chil-

munion at the mass celebrated early
yesterday morning, and also attended
the solemn high mass celebration. The
class presented an interesting sight as
it filed into the church, the boys wear-
ing a white ribbon on their arm and
the little girls gowned in white and
wearing wreaths of evergreens and
flowers.

Procession of Sacrament.

At the conclusion of the mass, di-
rected by Father Aylward, the chil-
dren filed from the church to the

REV. MR. VINING ON HIGHER CRITICS

Says That Each Year Discover-
ies Are Being Made Which
Confirm the Bible.

In the course of his sermon at Tal-
bot Street Baptist Church yesterday
morning, Rev. A. J. Vining said:

"I have no fear whatever of the
white-choked higher critics. They
have tried to make out that there was
no Abraham, and that the first ten
chapters of Genesis are a myth. Thank
God, they were not able to do it, and
every year excavations are being made
and discoveries are taking place which
confirm everything in the Scriptures
to be true."

Mr. Vining will shortly preach a spe-
cial sermon dealing with the higher
critics and higher criticism.

One of the weak points in modern
life is the lack of the altar in the
home," said Rev. Walter Moffat at
Chalmers Church last night. "If we
had more of the altar and family wor-
ship in the home, we would have more
of God's blessing in the churches."

Mr. Moffat's sermon dealt with the
stirring up of the children of Israel by
Gideon.

At the Colborne Street Methodist
Church last evening, Rev. F. E. Mal-
lot delivered the first of a series of
sermons on the life of the Apostle
Paul, dealing with his early life under
the title of "The Persecuting Pharisee."
Mr. Malott pointed out that the two
great enemies of the Christian church
at its beginning were pharisaic Judaism
and pagan Rome, the earliest of
all the persecutions being the stoning
of Stephen by the Pharisees. Paul's
persecution he showed arose from a
desire to satisfy his ideals of right-
eousness rather than from any enmity.

Rev. John Morris, who goes to the
Memorial Church as assistant rector,
with Canon Hague, was to have been
ordained, but owing to illness was
unable to be present. His ordination
has been postponed indefinitely.

Bishop Williams has announced that
the men ordained yesterday will be sta-
tioned as follows: Rev. S. S. Hardy,
assistant rector to Very Rev. Dean
Davis, at St. James' Church, South
London; Rev. W. B. Hawkins, Dutton;
Rev. W. H. Moore, Kingsville; Rev.
H. F. Hutton, Theford, and Rev. A. L.
Charles, Milverton.

Last night Mr. Hardy conducted the
services in St. George's Church, West
London. Mr. Moore, at St. Luke's
Church, Broughdale; Mr. Charles, at
Christ Church; Mr. Hutton, at the
Church of St. John the Evangelist.
