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SAYS ACTRESS DOES
NOT NEED BEAUTY

Mme. Simone, Famous French
Emotional Player, Arrives
in Gotham.

New York, Sept. 21.—Mme. Simone, the famous French emotional actress, arrived in New York today with her husband, M. Casimir Perier, son of the former president of France. She bears a striking resemblance to Sarah Bernhardt, when the latter was a much younger woman, and the diva was one of the first to note and comment on this resemblance.

The customs officers at the pier were the first to encounter the wit of Mme. Simone, who held a small dog in her arms while her luggage was being examined.

"What value do you place on your beauty?" Mme. Simone was asked.

She drew back in surprise and put a protecting hand on the head of "Chochotte."

"I do not value her as a dog," said Mme. Simone. "I value her as a friend. As a dog she is 12 years old and without value. As a friend she is beyond price. I leave it to you, gentlemen, to settle the value of this 'Chochotte' came in as a friend and duty free."

How To Be Happy.

Mme. Simone, who speaks English fluently, is to give English versions of some of her plays. She told her plans and discussed her art, the stage and how to be happy through married.

One could almost imagine from the attitude of Mme. Simone that she does not approve of Gaby Deslys.

"I am told that the taste here is discriminating," she said, "but I suppose it is the same as in Paris, where actresses are exploited for their beautiful clothes, their jewels, their personal beauty and such things. Ten years ago such a woman would not be tolerated on the stage in Paris. The growing habit of actresses hanging on clothes and jewels and parading the streets in their automobiles, in conspicuous places, is most vulgar. I am sorry to see that the public is rather amused than disgusted in this debauchery of art," said the brilliant actress.

"Every woman or man who appears on the stage should be there solely on the ground of art. Beauty is a splendid accessory to art, but it is not absolutely necessary to a great artist. Some of the greatest are not beautiful. Some are beautiful, but there is nothing in them to make them great. It is the something in her face that glorifies it and awakens the most wonderful emotions in those who watch her marvelous art."

"Do you believe that an actress loses anything of her art through marriage?" she was asked.

"Ah, no. She must have heart contentment to be at her best in art. She must be surrounded by the calm and quiet that come from the knowledge that she is happy in her personal environment. No woman is happy or content without love, and in marriage she finds the happiness and contentment that allow free play to her art."

Mme. Simone has a high appreciation of acting and the stage, and believes that true success can only be achieved through study of the classics of the drama.

Mme. Simone believes in the good and beauty of color on the health and dispositions of individuals, and practices the theory.

"I never wear any color but green, or blue, and white, or combination of the latter two," she said. "Green to a woman of my emotional nature is restful, and white brings out the individuality of a woman whose colors detract from her personality."

WELLS AND ATTELL
MIX AT NEW YORK

Lightweight and Featherweight Clash in Ring at Gotham.

Madison Square Garden, New York City, Sept. 20.—By outboxing Abe Attell in one of the rounds of the bout here tonight, Matt Wells, English lightweight, was awarded the decision over the king of the featherweight division.

At 19:22 Attell and Wells entered the ring, attended by a big corps of handlers. Wells' leading seconds were George MacDonald and Boyo Driscoll, and Attell was attended by Jim Flynn and Kid Broad. Attell was smiling while the gloves were being adjusted. His weight was said to be 122 pounds, while the Englishman weighed in at 5 o'clock, not turning the beam at the stipulated 135 pounds. Judging from the appearance of the boys when they stripped, there was about thirteen pounds difference in favor of Wells.

Luxurious New Cars For C. P. R.
Montreal Service.

Another triumph in car building has been achieved by the C. P. R., and it marks a further advance in railroad engineering.

The new compartment observation cars, which have just been sent out from the Angus shops are intended for the service between Toronto and Montreal, and as evidence of the growing popularity of the service between the North Toronto station and Montreal, they are attached to the train leaving that station at 10 p.m. daily.

These new cars have seven compartments, a drawing-room, an observation parlor and an observation platform. The entrance to the rooms is from the side of the car, and the cars, insuring absolute privacy. There are two berths, the lower being made up from two double seats, and there are all toilet requirements in each compartment.

The cars are lighted with electricity, and in the warm weather are kept cool with electric fans.

These cars are models of luxury and comfort, in which the C. P. R. standard of equipment excels. 2u

CHARGED WITH MURDER.
Kissimmee, Fla., Sept. 20.—"Wilful murder" was the finding of the coroner's jury in the case of Elder Egbert B. Gillette, of the Shaker colony. He is charged with murder of Sister Sadie Marchant, of the colony, to whom with the aid of Sister Elizabeth Sears, on the 22nd day of last month, Gillette administered chloroform following the giving of opiates. STOLYPIN'S SUCCESSOR
Minister of Finance Kokovtzeff to Be-
come Russian Premier.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 21.—The Novoe Vremya says M. Kokovtzeff, minister of finance, will become premier, as well as head of the treasury department, and that M. Makarov will become minister of the interior. The latter was assistant minister of the interior under M. Stolypin, who died in the assassination in addition to the presidency of the cabinet.

The semi-official Rossiya says today: "M. Stolypin was murdered, but not vanquished, and this day and hour will live in Russian history, for however rich the Russian nation is in intellect it can not show many sons possessed of such an abundance of knightly virtues as the deceased."

Dr. Afanaseff, one of the surgeons in attendance on Premier Stolypin, furnishes the following account of the dead statesman's last hours:

"The patient suffered severely all day and groaned from time to time. On one occasion he called out: 'Take a letter, give it to me; give me a lead pencil; the patient knew he was dying. At 9 o'clock last night he spoke his last words which were, 'Lay me on my side.' He lost consciousness an hour before his death. At 10 o'clock this morning the body was dissected, after which it was embalmed."
