## INDIAN IS CHARGED WITH PROBABLY FATALTY STABBING ANOTHER INDIAN ON RESERVE

Peter Seneca Is Being Sought by Police for Attacking and Badly Cutting Samuel Delaray on Welnesday Night.

THE INJURED MAN IS NOW UNCONSCIOUS

It Is Not Expected That He Will Recover and a Charge of Murder May Be Laid Against Seneca.

Samuel Delaray, an Indian on the Muncey Reserve, is lying at death's door at his home, from wounds received in a brawl there on Tuesday night. He charges Peter Seneca with having committed the deed.

Posses of police are pursuing Seneca, who up to the present time has

The injured man was taken into the house, and for a day or so, it did not appear that he was very badly hurt. Yesterday he began to grow worse, and today, it was stated that the Indian is dying. He is in an uncon-

Seneca disappeared, and posses are hunting for him. Delaray is frightfully cut-up, according to the latest advices. He is cut on the left side of the face from the ear around under the chin. There is
