

## INDIAN IS CHARGED WITH PROBABLY FATALTY STABBING ANOTHER INDIAN ON RESERVE

Peter Seneca Is Being Sought by Police for Attacking and Badly Cutting Samuel Delaray on Wednesday Night.

THE INJURED MAN IS NOW UNCONSCIOUS. It Is Not Expected That He Will Recover and a Charge of Murder May Be Laid Against Seneca.

Samuel Delaray, an Indian on the Muncy Reserve, is lying at death's door at his home, from wounds received in a brawl there on Tuesday night. He charges Peter Seneca with having committed the deed.

Poses of police are pursuing Seneca, who up to the present time has eluded them.

They expect to capture him today. He will be held pending the outcome of Delaray's injuries.

It is probable that a charge of murder will be laid against him.

### THE TROUBLE.

The row started after the fair, which is always an occasion of a big time on the reserve.

Whiskey generally flows rather freely, it is said, and fights are numerous and sometimes deadly.

Three or four years ago, Thomas Noah, an Indian, got into a fight with another Indian named Parks, with the result that the latter was stabbed to death. Noah is at present serving a twelve-year term in Kingston.

According to one story in circulation at the reserve, Delaray and Seneca were among a number of Indians, who had been imbibing freely.

A fight started, and it is claimed, Delaray struck Seneca, knocking him down. The latter jumped up, and, pulling a knife, attacked Delaray, cutting him badly.

The injured man was taken into the house, and for a day or so, it did not appear that he was very badly hurt. Yesterday he began to grow worse, and today, it was stated that the Indian is dying. He is in an unconscious condition.

Seneca disappeared, and posers are hunting for him.

Delaray is frightfully cut-up, according to the latest advice. He is cut on the left side of the face from the ear around under the chin. There is another large slash at right angles to the first cut.

After the fight the injured man rushed to the home of his aunt, Mrs. Timothy.

A traveller named Snider from London was in the house at the time, and he kept pressure in the wounds preventing Delaray from bleeding to death. To this fact Delaray owes the fact that he is alive today.

Dr. Dewar, of Melbourne, was immediately summoned, and dressed the wounds.

There was a report in circulation today that Delaray had died, but it proved untrue. His brother, who was arrested on a charge of indecent assault on an Indian woman, made the statement at the court house today.

### Look Out for "Raised" Bills.

Bankers and merchants are complaining that many "raised" bills are in circulation in the city. The new Canadian dollar bill is very similar in color to the new \$4 bills, and it would not require much of an artist to raise the smaller one to the higher denomination. Storekeepers state that it frequently happens that the larger bill is accepted as worth but 100 cents, and the clerks must frequently apologize for not making the right change. "There are a number of raised bills in circulation here," a bank manager informed The Advertiser today. "We have come across some of them, and we are keeping a sharp lookout for them every day."

## MOTHERS' CLUBS DELEGATES WILL INSPECT THE HOSPITAL

Complaint Having Been Made to Several Clubs, the Central Body Decided to Inquire Into the Matter

Owing to complaints received from patients in Victoria Hospital, a committee from the Mothers' Clubs of the city, composed of Mrs. Irwin, Mrs. Wyckoff, and others, will visit the institution this afternoon, and make an inspection before passing judgment.

It is claimed by some patients that they have not been properly treated, and that they are not allowed their own nurses.

The women patients have complained to several Mothers' Clubs, and the central organization at its meeting decided to visit the hospital and report.

Some time ago, the hospital trust agreed that no outside nurse should be admitted to the hospital, and that special nurses must be taken from the staff. The public wards alone are closed to outside physiotherapists.

It is thought that these facts may have been the cause of some of the trouble.

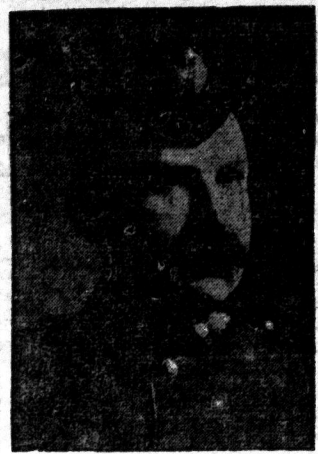
## BALLOT TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE IN JANUARY

## FOUGHT IN THE IRISH BRIGADE FOR POPE PIUS IX. IN ITALY

Thomas Noonan, of London, Is One of the Few Survivors of the Famous Garibaldi Wars Half a Century Ago.

Mr. Thomas Noonan, of this city, says they were made prisoners at the battle of Castiglione, on Sept. 18, 1860.

The Pope had only about 5,000 men in the army, to which Mr. Noonan belonged, and before much fighting had taken place his holiness asked for peace to avoid further bloodshed.

The Irish Brigade was made up of men especially selected by the priests of different parishes in Ireland, and none but young men having a clean civil and church record were accepted. Major O'Reilly was the commander.

Mr. Noonan has two medals which were presented to him by the Vatican testifying to the fact that he had been a member of the papal army.

## WILCOX'S DEATH AN ACCIDENT CORONER'S JURY IS SATISFIED

From the Evidence Submitted, No One Is To Blame for the Death of Sarnia Brakeman in London Yards.

"That Thomas Wilcox came to his death at Victoria Hospital from injuries sustained by being struck and run over by a G. T. R. yard engine in the East London yards on Tuesday, the 24th inst. From the evidence no blame attaches to anyone else for the accident."

The above verdict was returned by the jury at the inquest into the death of Thomas Wilcox, held last evening in the police station. Only three witnesses gave evidence. Mr. William Ogilvie, night yard foreman, who was the only eye-witness of the affair, stated that he was riding on the front board of the yard engine at the time of the accident. The engine was running about five or six miles an hour, the regulation rate for a yard engine in the yards. Witness did not see Wilcox until he stepped right in front of the engine. Wilcox apparently came from the north side of the coal sheds, and did not see the yard engine approaching. Witness signaled the engine of the yard to stop, but the engine did not stop. Wilcox was struck by the engine, and was thrown back to the scene of the accident, and found Wilcox. He was badly injured.

Engineer's testimony.

Mr. Hugh McGowan, the engineer on the engine which struck Wilcox, was next called. He stated that the engine was running at the time of the accident.

Dr. Sealborn, who held the post-mortem, stated that death was due to hemorrhage and shock caused by injuries to the spine.

The jury then returned the above verdict.

Mr. D. M. McGraw, assistant claims agent for the G. T. R., was called next at the inquest in the interests of the company.

## A WINGHAM YOUNG LADY ATTACKED ON THE STREET

Miss Frances Davidson was walking along Main street escorted by Mr. Postlip, and when passing the vacant plot between Johnson's restaurant and Zeigler's photograph studio, Miss Davidson was attacked, it is alleged, by a man named Andrew Cruikshanks, who, it is said, hurled a file at her. She managed to dodge the

missile, which crashed through the plate-glass window of the photograph gallery. The police were called at once, but Cruikshanks had escaped. His arrest is expected shortly.

The police held the C. E. R. train for twenty minutes, thinking Cruikshanks aboard.

He is on the Indian list, but it is said he was under the influence of liquor today. The file is a murderous-looking weapon, and had it reached Miss Davidson would have made a serious wound.

## TIED TO AXLE OF A FREIGHT CAR

A Montreal Man Found in a Perilous Position.

ATTACKED BY A GANG Attempt To Do Away With Man Who Holds Damaging Evidence.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Oct. 27.—With his head in a bag, filled with ashes, and his arms and legs tied around the axle to the wheels of a Canadian Pacific freight car, Mike Schuts, a Pole, 35 years of age, whose home is at 57 Manufacturers Street, St. Charles, was found last night by Constables Roy and Brunet, of the Grand Trunk street police station, at St. Patrick street. He sent word to the Grand Trunk street police station, and Constable Charland sent Constables Roy and Brunet to investigate. The police found a man tied to the axle of one of the trucks of a freight car, with a bag tied over his head. The groans the watchman heard were coming from the bag. When the policemen untied the rope binding the man to the axle and took the bag from around his neck, they found it was half filled with ashes or cinders, and that there was a big piece of cotton waste tied around the man's face for a gag.

Attacked by Four.

He said that while walking along St. Patrick street towards his home early in the evening, he pulled the bag over his head and tied him under the axle, although he did not know where they had tied him until the police released him.

Lieut. Charland was not satisfied with the story told by Schuts, so held him as a prisoner on a charge of loitering, and this morning he will be sent to police headquarters.

The police are inclined to think that Schuts may know something about the shooting of Joseph Dubois, who died at his home in Centre Street on Tuesday night. The police think the four men who attacked Schuts may have tried to get rid of him, for fear that he would tell what he knew in connection with the Dubois case.

## WILD SCENES ON EXCHANGE FOLLOW STEEL TRUST SUIT

Panicky Rush to Sell on Wall Street This Morning—Record Block Sold 'Mid Scene of Great Confusion.

New York, Oct. 27.—There was a wild rush to sell United States Steel stock at the opening of the market today as a result of the Government's dissolution suit. The common stock opened with the sale of 28,000 shares, and fell to 53½, a loss of 5 points. The preferred stock fell 5½.

The floor of the Stock Exchange was a scene of confusion. Long before trading had begun the brokers were jammed tightly about the post at which steel stocks are traded in. Orders to sell the stock had poured in over night from owners in every part of the country who were alarmed by the dissolution suit. When the gong was sounded to announce the opening of the market, such a din was made by the shouting, struggling traders that it was impossible for several minutes to learn the course of the market. The first block of 28,000 shares was one of the largest ever recorded in steel stocks, although it was exceeded twice last month when the market was demoralized by liquidation of the stock on the part of the holders who feared that the Government was to begin suit. Within the first fifteen minutes 27,500 shares were traded in.

Rallies a Point.

It was soon evident that the stock was receiving support. The first sale of 53½ was the low point, and it rallied a point. At no time during the early trading did it approach the low figure of last month, which was 51½. Trading in the preferred stock

and the 5 per cent sinking fund bonds also was very heavy. The preferred stock, after breaking 5½, rallied 2 points. The bonds opened with a block of \$100,000 at 100½, a decline of 1½.

The Market Upset.

The general market was upset by the excited trading in the steel securities. Union Pacific, Reading, Lehigh Valley and the other speculative favorites, were the heaviest losers, although declines in few cases exceeded two points. Liquidation in these stocks, however, was much lighter and the market soon grew quieter, with the steel stocks being the focus of the trading.

The storm broke with renewed fury after the first recovery in prices. The rally which followed the first violent break resulted in further selling on an enormous scale, and the market was badly unsettled in the morning.

Dropped at London.

London, Oct. 27.—United States Steel opened on the London market this morning at 50, then fell to 47, and finally to 44½. The amount of stock changing hands was small compared with the big decline. The principal offerings appeared to have been cabled overnight from Wall Street.

Bear covering later in the morning lifted the quotation to 50.

Decline on Bourse.

Berlin, Oct. 27.—Prices declined on the Bourse today. American shares were especially weak. Exchange on London 20 marks 47½ pence for the pound. Money 3 per cent; private discount rate 4½ per cent.

Paris, Oct. 27.—Unfavorable New York advices caused a weak opening on the Bourse today. Prices improved later, and the market closed steady. Closing: Three per cent, rentes, 84 francs 80 centimes; for the account, Exchange on London, 25 francs 16½ centimes for checks.

The Y. M. C. A. secretary, Mr. Rean, was appointed as secretary of the local committee, and Rev. Mr. McErvin presided.

In addition to securing representatives from each congregation the Woodstock men will interest themselves and the pastors of the nearby churches, so that a good number of men from different congregations will attend.

The denominational conference to take place in London on the third day of Nov. 8, and the mass meeting for women to be addressed by Sir Andrew Fraser, will be attended by the delegates and speakers.

Mr. A. J. Robinson is in Ingersoll this afternoon and evening arranging for a strong delegation from that town.

The Alberta conference at Regina closed on Wednesday with addresses by John R. Mott and Sir Andrew Fraser. It was largely attended, and a deep interest and enthusiasm in missions was evidenced by all the delegates and speakers.
