THE WAR IN THE BALKANS

London, Thursday, Oct. 17.-The Northern Montenegrin army has retaken Berans, according to dispatches received last night from Pedycritza. The Turks were driven out after two days fighting, and, according to the dispatches which come from Montenegrin sources, lost 700 prisoners, besides 14 guns and large amounts of supplies. The same dispatches tell of another Montenegrin victory this time to the credit of the southern army of invasion, which is said to have taken Mount Mourich, a fortified post opposite Tarakasch. Constantinople reports indicate that skirmishes are in progress along the Turkish-Servian frontier near Kossovo, and also have it that the Montenegrins of the southern army have destroyed the villages between Lake Soutari and the sea, and have massacred the women and children they found in them.
