THE WAR IN THE BALKANS

London, Thursday, Oct. 17.—The Northern Montenegrin army has taken Berane, according to dispatches received last night from Belgrade. The Turks were driven out after two days' fighting, and, according to the dispatches which come from Montenegrin sources, lost 700 prisoners, besides 14 guns and large amounts of supplies. The same dispatches tell of another Montenegrin victory, this time to the credit of the southern army of invasion, which is said to have taken Mount Mourich, a fortified post opposite Tarakosch. Constantinople reports indicate that skirmishes are in progress along the Turkish-Serbian frontier near Kossovo, and also have taken the Montenegrins of the southern army have destroyed the villages between Lake Scutari and the sea, and have massacred the women and children they found in them.

News of the middle army, which is encamped in the neighborhood of Tuzla, is lacking so far tonight.

L. C. Pickard, agent of an express company at Omaha, Neb., identified remnants of a suitcase said to have contained bombs which McManigal shipped from there to Indianapolis.

INSPECTOR DUNCAN ON PENSION LIST

Toronto Police Commission Compromise Offer Charges Against Officer.

Toronto, Oct. 17.—Almost as dramatic as the developments in the case of Inspector Walter Duncan was its denouement. After protracted sessions and lengthy considerations of the police commission, Mayor Geary and Judge Winchester were unable to arrive at more than a compromise. No finding was made on the matters which incensed the suspension of the inspector, his conduct of the Farmers' Bank case, his evidence before Chief Justice Meredith, or the question of his reliability and veracity. In lieu of the two commissioners adopted a resolution, recommending the officer and retiring him, and providing that he be paid his pension if payments are continued until that recognition falls due.

DELAWARE FAIR WAS A RECORD BREAKER

Perfect Weather and Splendid Exhibits Made Show Ideal For Crowd.

Delaware, Oct. 16.—Perfect weather brought a record crowd here today for the Delaware fair. Fully four thousand people were here, and every street was lined with automobiles and the vehicles of all kinds. Many people came out in cars from London.

The fair itself was the best of a long line of successful shows held here. The program of speeding events was never surpassed, and the neck-and-neck finishes kept the crowd in a great state of excitement.

The dairy hall, in the centre of the village, which contained the ladies' and domestic work, was one of the principal attractions, and the displays were among the distinctive features of the fair. The bread and butter displays

were especially worthy of mention. In the neighborhood of 30 entries of each of these products completely occupied the centre tables.

Some Fine Horses.

The horses were fully up to the average of former years. It required much deliberation on the part of the judges to choose the winners. Mr. W. M. Fauds, of Monsey, had eleven entries in the agricultural and heavy draft classes and secured several of the prizes. Neil McLean, Mayfair, and Carmichael Bros., of Melbourne, also had large exhibits.
