Mr. Pocock Combats Mr. Richter's Analysis of Waterworks Finances -Claims Large Surpluses.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: I request the privilege of your columns to reply to the statement of figures on the waterworks department presented by Ald. Richter to the city ouncil at its last meeting, and pubished in your issue of the 5th inst. In the first place he selects arbitrarly two items of expense, i.e., "salaries

As a matter of fact the sum of \$12,017.88, includes insurance, printing and advertising, stationery and postage, and utility equipment accounts, which are not covered by the term "general expense" in the preceding years. On the other hand inspectors' salaries now carried by workshop account should be added to give the total of salaries. The general expense for 1912 also includes office rent paid to the city never previously charged, and extraordinary expenditure in connection with the re-arrang-

ing and re-constructing the office owing to the sale of the city hall to the Royal Bank. As compared with other years the items general expense and office salaries actually amount to \$10,-867.59, which is 9.2 per cent of the revenue from consumers, or only .7 per cent more than in 1908. This increase of general expense and office salaries will be readily understood if the high rate of wages in the past few years is taken into consideration together with the fact that whereas up till 1909 only

360 meters were installed there are to date 1,660 in use, which entail a great deal of extra expense. For 1908, Ald. Richter takes the net surplus as \$31,408.37, whereas this includes the sum of \$4,846.49, which was the unexpended balance of certain appropriations made in previous years, and which should surely not be treated as revenue in making comparisons. If we apply Ald. Richter's method of figuring to the year 1907 we find that

while the water rates for consumers were \$92,428.63, the general expense and salaries amounted to \$12,691.00 for that year, or to 13.7 per cent of reeipts from consumers' rates! BRILLIANT DISPLAY OF FIERY METEORS

The Skies Were Illuminated by a Score of Ethereal Tramps Last Evening.

PHENOMENON STRIKING

Some of the Meteors Were Very Large, While Others Were Not So Great in Extent-Many See Them.

A wonderful display of metors in the sky last night about 9 o'clock thrilled a large number of citizens who were fortunate enough to be on the streets at the time. It was a most thrilling exhibition, and created a profound impression on the eye wit-

The meteors came from the northvest and proceeded to all appearances n a leisurely manner towards the

orilliant tail of light. It seemed to be but a few feet above the earth. Many approximated it at 100 feet, but distances at night are none too reliable, and the meteors were probably many thousands of feet distant. Follow the Leader. As the first meteor sped across the sky the vague outlines of a man's fig-

ure could be seen. This was not the vivid imagination of some supersensitive person, but several people who saw the display from various quarters in the city declared this to be the ase. On some superstitious people it ad rather a depressing effect, as they immediately began to conjure up terrible things to happen in this sinful ld world.

Following the leader there were a arge number of them. One series was irst seen as a large ball. When close at hand it spread out, forming inumerable little meteors leisurely rossing the blue sky. There were stars, and for a period of several min-utes they held the watchers spell-

The appearance of meteors is not unusual, but the brilliancy of the display last evening is rather unusual, ew of the eye witnesses having had the privilege of seeing anything like it prior to this time.

Phenomenon Not Unusual.

Prof. Dearness also explained that the phenomenon was not unusual, although the display may have been unusually brilliant, The earth in its progress passes rapidly through pockets of gas, which are ignited by the friction, and ignite, causing a vivid illumination. This process is going on continually, although it is impossible o see many of the meteors.

It was reported that some of the neteors had struck the earth, causing a loud report, but this is not borne out by a majority of those who were privileged to see the display. The orbs were headed towards the southeast when last seen, and showed no disposition whatever to drop in London

or anywhere near it.

The number could not be approximated, but there were over a score of them. The largest was greater in size than the celebrated Halley's comet, of which so much was written a few

Composition of Meteors. The average meteor, or meteorite, as it may be called, is simply a mass of on or nickel and rarely of stone comosition. Like an infinite number of other solid substances in space it is forced in a swift motion by magnetic attractions. The meteors seen last night were very probably pure iron. wing to their rapid movement they would take on a spherical shape. Attracted magnetically to the earth's surface they would come at an angle determined by their own and the earth's speed of motion. While in space they were extremely cold, their temperature being about the same as that of the ether, namely, about 200 or 300 degrees below zero. Descending to the zone of the atmosphere, which commences about 100 miles above the earth, they suddenly ignited, due to the friction of the air, and, of ocurse, became at once visible as glowing bodies o the people on London's streets. As they were travelling at from 30 to 50 miles per second they must have struck

the earth a moment or so after having een seen. It will be remembered that about seven years ago a meteor of iron weighing six pounds lighted near a nouse in the vicinity of Shelburne, Ont. t had imbedded itself several feet in

he earth. The meteors that fly through space vary in size from a cubic millimetre, or very tiny pea to bodies weighing many tons. Those that are consumed in the atmosphere fall to the earth's surface as dust. In the Arctic circle where they have perpetual snow, me-teoric dust is commonly seen.
