IT'S THE TRUTH THAT HURTS A. J. SMALL

Toronto Magnate Has Plenty of Abuse for The Advertiser, But Not One Word as to Discrimination in Prices of Attractions-Why Doesn't Printing of Programs By The Advertiser Job Company Influence Criticisms?

In a statement which was refused publication in the legitimate newspaper to which it was submitted, but which appears in a local weekly advertising sheet. A. J. Small, the Toronto owner of the local theatre, issues a statement supposed to describe the relations of his London theatre and The Advertiser.

The Advertiser wishes to tell the non-resident owner of the local theatre, which he uses to discriminate against London theatregoers, that his claim that The Advertiser attempted to hold up the local theatre for advertising and theatre tickets is a statement false, libelous, and without the slightest basis of truth.

Mr. Small insinuates that he could influence The Advertiser to withhold its "attacks" by complying with a higher rate for advertising, which was put into effect when The Advertiser commenced the issue of a morning edition, AND WHICH EVERY LOCAL BUS-INESSMAN WAS GLAD TO PAY, WITH THE EX-CEPTION OF THE TORONTO THEATRICAL MAG-NATE. HE ALONE REFUSED THE INCREASE.

The answer to this charge that The Advertiser is "attacking" the Grand in the hope of forcing it to advertise and disgorge so many tickets, is this: At the present time Mr. Small is having his programs printed by The Advertiser Job Printing Company. If The Advertiser were afraid of the loss of Mr. Small's business, would it speak the truth about theatricals while it was receiving a large amount weekly for the printing of his programs? Why does Mr. Small not coerce us by threatening to print the program else-

The truth, and the whole truth, is that The Advertiser has never been, and never will be, the tool of Mr. Small. It has always carefully edited the advance notices which were sent in by his local manager, and has been frank in the discussion of the plays presented here. It has not given its columns freely to him to do with them as he willed.

But the theatrical magnate wants to own the newspaper and dictate what shall be inserted.

When Mr. Small refused to meet the rate put in effect because of the largely-increased circulation coincident with the inauguration of a morning edition. The Advertiser stated to his local manager that the matter of tickets could be allowed to stand over, and had previously intimated that in future all advance notices to be printed would be furnished to the public by the newspaper, and not by the theatre.

When Mr. Small refused to accept the new advertising rates, The Advertiser informed him that it was a matter of business, in which no discrimination could be made, and refused to accept further advertising

Since the opening of the theatrical season, The lvertiser has paid the admission of its critic to the theatre, and has been absolutely fair in its criticisms of local attractions. On only one occasion was an attraction severely criticized, this being "Annie Laurie."

We leave it to those who saw the play if the criticism was unfair.

Mr. Small and his local manager were laughing in their sleeves because they could not understand the fairness with which The Advertiser "attacked" them until this paper's attention was called to the rank discrimination practiced against local theatregoers in the appearance of Lawrance D'Orsay. This attraction appeared in St. Thomas at \$1 prices, and in London at \$1.50 prices, and later in Toronto at \$1 prices. All of the theatres played in are the property of the Toronto magnate. When this was printed there was a great howl, but no explanation.

To support the claim The Advertiser published an advertisement from a local paper and from a St. Thomas paper, later from a Toronto paper. The St. Thomas and London advertisements are given below
