

Tigers Beat Hard For C.R.U. Title---Sarnia C. Again School Champs

HAD CHANCE RIGHT TO END

Both Teams Resorted To Kicking in Mud.

WEAKEN AT LAST

HAMILTON, Dec. 10.—The rugby season ended here today when Petrolia and Tigers played out for the intermediate championship. There was a small crowd present, and the field was very muddy.

Petrolia won the toss and kicked off with a breeze at their backs. Tigers got to center field, and lost on interference. On the first down Wilson kicked; the ball went over Crocker's head and it rained to deadline. Petrolia 1, Tigers 0.

Quince, Pearson and Elford gained yards on backsides and a miff by the back division sent the play back. Wilson's kick forced Galbraith to punt on Wilson's kick. Petrolia 2, Tigers 0.

Tigers were penalized on several occasions which cost them points, as they were in a position to score. Hamilton held the line well, and ripped holes in Petrolia's line near the end of this quarter.

Gallivan ran the ball from behind the line and saved a point, the whistle blowing as he went down. Half-time—Petrolia 2, Tigers 4.

Soon after half-time Tigers forced Wilson to rouse. Tigers 5, Petrolia 2. A long kick gave Petrolia a point, when the ball rolled to the deadline. Tigers played safe and allowed it to roll to the line.

Tigers 6, Petrolia 2. Galbraith was forced to rouse for another point for the visitors. Tigers 7, Petrolia 2. Elford kicked for a touch in goal. Elford played a stronger game in this quarter, and had the wind in their favor.

Third quarter ended—Tigers 8, Petrolia 4. Gallivan was downed behind the posts for a rouse. Tigers 9, Petrolia 4. Hamilton kicked at nearly every opportunity. Gallivan recovered one behind the line for another Tiger point. Tigers 10, Petrolia 4.

Tigers were able to keep the play at the Petrolia end, and were in possession. Gallivan ran a kick. Wilson kicked to Gibb, who made a short run and then kicked to the deadline. Tigers 11, Petrolia 4.

Gibb kicked behind the posts, and when Wilson touched and overran, Gibb converted. Tigers 12, Petrolia 4. Petrolia ran a little better than before, but was superior. Quince ran the ball from his own line to midfield, where play ended.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Moguls and near-moguls of the big and near-big leagues in baseball moved into New York today for the annual league pow-wow expected to last throughout the week, and result in a number of trades and purchases affecting well-known diamond stars.

The International League will hold its annual meeting tomorrow, the National League gathering is scheduled for Tuesday, the American for Wednesday, and the joint major meeting for Thursday.

Garry Hermann, president of the Cincinnati Club, and his faithful manager, Pat Moran, have been here for several days. They joined today in informal discussions of the game with Stoneham, McGraw, and McQuade, Heydler, Ebbets, Baker and Grant.

President Navin of the Detroit Tigers and Fred Mitchell, manager of the Boston Braves, came late today. Ray Raymond Cobb is expected tomorrow. Among the International Leagueers in town today are Duffell of Baltimore; Stallings and Hapgood of Rochester; Landgraf, of Syracuse; and Moroney of Toronto. Bill Donohue, one-time manager of the Yankees and Phillies, was on deck early with a strong conviction that he had hopes of managing the Reading Club of the International League next year.

At Buffalo, where the New York Giants and Cincinnati Club figured in during the minor leagues' confab last week, the situation was a bit different. It was said, of wholesale purchases and trades to be arranged here. The Philadelphia Club, President Baker said, expects to buy several players, while the Pirates, Reds and Chicago clubs also are in the market for new talent.
