EYE WITNESS TO MURDERS TELLS SLAYER'S NAME

Mrs. Jane Gibson Declares Headlights on Car Showed Faces.

PROSECUTOR SPEAKS

Wilbur A. Mott Declares He Could Make Immediate Arrest.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 26.—Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the slain rector of the Protestant Episcopal Church of St. John the Evangelist, and her brother, Henry Stevens, are man and woman named in the sworn statement of Mrs. Jane Gibson, self-styled eye-witness of the double slaying of the Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Reinhart Mills, on the night of Sept. 14 last.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 26.—In a statement to the press today, Mrs. Jane Gibson, self-proclaimed eyewitness of the murder of Rev. Dr. Edward W. Hall and his choir singer, Mrs. James Mills, declared she had identified positively for the county authorities the man who did the shooting and the woman who accompanied him.

Mrs. Gibson identified the man's appearance as follows: Heavy build, bushy eyebrows and a thick mustache.

At the time of the shooting, Mrs. Gibson said she did not know the man who did the shooting, but later she identified him at the court house.

Stones Discovered Near Drayton Prove To Be Garnets, Not Rubies.

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—Expectations that Alton A. Neil's discovery on the banks of the Conestoga River near Drayton, Ont., would prove to be rubies were shattered today, when a sample of the stones reached the office of the minister of mines. Deputy Minister Thomas Gibson pronounced them to be garnets, and stated that they were not of gem quality. Garnets of gem quality have never been found in Canada, he said.

Mr. Gibson said it was not an unusual thing for garnets to be mistaken for rubies. Only a few weeks ago some sand was sent to the parliament building, with the message that it contained minute rubies. The "rubies" proved to be garnets.

where she had been taken to make a statement. Mrs. Gibson said that the woman companion of the killer did not know her, but that she (Mrs. Gibson) knew the other woman, having seen her once before at a rummage sale.

Mrs. Gibson also told of seeing three automobiles near the scene of the tragedy on the night of September 14, and said that the headlights of one and flashlights carried by the slayer and his companion, assisted her to see their faces.

Waits "Opportunity Time." Wilbur A. Mott, special prosecutor, conducting the investigation into the murder mystery, declared he had evidence sufficiently strong to warrant an immediate arrest. He added, however, that he preferred to await an "opportunity time" before ordering an arrest made.

"The state is not 'up a tree' in the case, despite reports to the contrary," Mott said. "We could make an arrest now if we wished, but we prefer to wait until we have clinched our case and are ready to go to immediate trial."

CLEAR BLINHEIM MAN ON CHARGE OF STEALING BOAT

Magistrate Arnold of Chatham Dismisses Action Against Meral Johnston.

BLINHEIM, Oct. 25.—Before County Magistrate S. B. Arnold of Chatham, Meral Johnston of South Harwich was dismissed this afternoon on a charge of breaking into the boat house, on or about October 16, of Charles Gerow at Raglan, and stealing a boat.

Crown Attorney Smith of Chatham prosecuted and W. G. Kerr of Chatham appeared for Johnston. Evidence was given by Barney Harris and Gerald Gerow, witnesses called by the crown. Harris told of being with Johnston about a month ago, and of entering the building to get out his own boat that was there, and that Johnston had opened the building. Gerald Gerow told of putting on the locks on the door, and finding the one broken. Johnston told of opening the building with Harris, but declared that he never broke a lock and had not been in the building for about a month, and never took out the Gerow boat, but told of another man who did use it. The boat was afterwards returned.

Magistrate Arnold, in dismissing the case, stated there appeared no grounds for laying the charge against Johnston, but that it was even the two parties. This was evident, for each forbade the other during the trial to set foot on the premises the other has possession of.

PACKERS REFUSE ENTIRE ORCHARDS AT ILBERTON

Unsprayed Fruit Sold to Canning Factory for 60 Cents per Hundred.

Special to London Advertiser. ILBERTON, Oct. 25.—The fine weather has been a great aid to the farmers, who are now busy getting their fall work done. Corn and roots are nearly all in, and good crops of mangels and potatoes are being harvested.

In some places rot has damaged the potato crop, but not to any very great extent. The Ilberton fruit growers have been busy for the past month picking their apples and pears. The eastern half of the association report an average crop, but the Coldstream section have very few to ship. The board has had two gangs of packers at work for some weeks, and it is expected that all will be packed during this week.

Two cars were shipped east last week, and owing to the car shortage were filled to capacity, the car shipped on Friday containing 250 barrels, which is almost a record. The quality of the fruit is good, whereas unsprayed, while in the unsprayed orchards the apples are very wormy and are graded domestic, with many culls. Some entire orchards have been sold to the canning factory and evaporator at 40 to 60 cents per hundredweight.

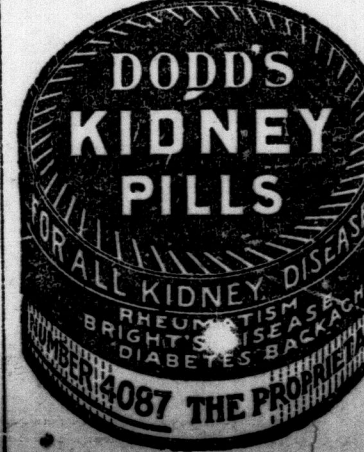
