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NOT DECIDED UPON CHANGING 'U' NAME
Col. Brown Declares No Definite Action Has Been Decided Yet.
ACT TO BE AMENDED
Governors Desire Greater Power Necessary To Conduct Efficient Organization.

Although the name "Western University" is admittedly in grave danger of passing into history as the result of a prolonged agitation for a more fitting designation, the board of governors in whose hands the matter rests is still undecided what course should be pursued. The question, however, is in the hands of a special committee, which was instructed by the board to bring in a report early in the New Year. This statement made to The Advertiser last night by Lieut.-Col. Walter J. Brown, executive secretary of the university, puts at rest a rumor widely circulated in the city yesterday that definite action had been taken to change the designation to "The University of Western Ontario." For a long time, in fact ever since the Western University began making a definite impression throughout the fourteen counties of which the city of London forms the hub, and more especially since the county began to make contributions towards the building fund of the institution, there has been a decided feeling that the name should be changed to characterize the constituency which it serves. The board of governors and others who vision the new university as a centre of higher education for the whole of Western Ontario, have always sympathized with the suggestion, and so at a meeting this week it was felt that the new schools were already under construction and the Legislative Assembly was to be asked next year to amend the constitutional act to bring it up-to-date, the time had arrived to take the question under consideration. As was expected, the discussion found no dissenting voice, but before any definite action was made and before any name was considered it was decided to refer the whole matter to a special committee. The committee has the question under consideration, and a report will be made to the board early in the New Year. But even if the committee decided that the name should be changed and the board of governors accept, the report the Ontario government still must be convinced that such action is necessary before a new name is adopted. With this done it will remain for the minister of education to select a name, although it is probable that he will act on suggestions made by the university board. With the counties clamoring that the new university be designated to determine the whole district which it serves, the name "Western Ontario University" or "University of Western Ontario" finds some supporters on the board of governors, although other names, such as the "University of London" have their champions. Those who oppose the name "Western Ontario University" fear that the government would not sanction such a name, in the fear that it would lead to confusion with Toronto University, officially recognized as the University of Ontario. To make all its departments worthy of the splendid institution that the Western will become when the new buildings on the banks of the River Thames are completed, the Ontario house will be asked early next session to amend the constitutional act of the university, which at present is sadly out of date. The board of governors and the senate must be given to an enlarged board and to the senate before the new university can be conducted most efficiently. Provisions will also be asked to allow greater and more effective extension work throughout the counties. By carrying the university to the people in this way, it is hoped that the Western will serve even more than ever the district of which it is the center and will become in truth the university of Western Ontario.

London, Dec. 28.—The Times announces the death in Dublin on Wednesday night of Mrs. Max Green, daughter of the late John Redmond. She was the author of several plays. Her husband, who was the chairman of the Irish prisoners board, was shot and killed last March.

FEW CHILDREN WORK IN WOODSTOCK CITY
Woodstock, Dec. 30.—The attendance officer for Woodstock yesterday reported that there are very few boys and girls with employment certificates in the city, as compared with other places. So far since the adolescent school act became effective he has issued but ten of these certificates, although he expected that soon after the new year started a few more would be given out to adolescents who have completed the necessary number of days at school.
