Fox kept his eyes on the judge while the latter was delivering sen-tence, while Sansone gazed at the fioor most of the time. Fox grew a shade paler when he heard the words that severed him from the outside world for fourteen years. He blew his nose nervously and jerked at the handcuff that linked his wrist to that

Fox, who is 27 years of age, will be a man of 41 when the prison gates finally clang behind him. Brought Into Court.

The prisoners were brought into the dock at 9:30 sharp, and his lord-ship, who was conducting a civil action, lost no time in addressing the young men.

"The law prevents violence against a woman." stated the court in pronouncing sentence. "You, Fox, have been found guilty of a most grave offence. Our law says everyone guilty of such offence is liable to suffer death or imprisonment for life. In my younger days the punishment was awful. Now parliament has seen fit to change the penalty from death to life imprisonment and a whipping.

"My inquiry concerning both of you has been such that I have not learned much in your favor. I will not sentence Fox to life imprison-



"While the O. T. A. is not perfect, it has resulted in a notable decrease of drunkenness evident to the public.

"Children come to school more regularly, are better clothed, are better fed and enjoy better health than they did under the licensed conditions of a few years ago.

"It is not a question of reducing our taxes, as the moderation league would have us consider; but it is a matter of removing, as far as possible. temptation from children and young people.

"Ontario stands as the central and banner province of the dominion. The return of the recognized use of liquor as a beverage in any form cannot but mar the proud record of our province.

"Men who are weak in resistance but honestly desire to leave liquor alone can now easily do so. It would be more difficult for them under any form of government control or license.

"Government control has no definite limitations, and gives no positive assurances for the future. Those provinces having it are not producing an enviable record.

"Those interested in the liquor traffic desire government control. "The present government promises a rigid enforcement of the O. T. A. if indorsed by the votes of the people. In this way we shall hold what we have and stand to gain.'

Nominations For General Elections on October 29 Being Held Today.

SOME SURPRISES

All Cabinet Ministers Except One Must Fight To Hold

Associated Press Despatch. London, Oct. 18.-Nominations of candidates for the parliamentary election to be held Oct. 29 are being made today throughout Great Britain and Northern Ireland. There will doubtless be the usual eleventhhour surprises affecting individual constituencies, but it is calculated beforehand that the candidates will number approximately 1,400.

It is noteworthy that the Liberals are nominating about 100 fewer than in the last election, while the Laborites will have about 100 more than on that occasion and according to a statement made last night will total well over 500, representing the big-

gest effort they have yet made.

The number of women seeking to enter parliament grows steadily with enter parliament grows steadily with every general election. As against the 34 last November there are 41 now, with the possibility that a few more will be listed when the papers are handed in today. New York Hospitals Report Largest Number of Cases in Years.
