In England ships are too often con-structed nowadays with an eye to cheapness and not to usefulness. This ought to be taken into consideration by those who are clamoring for free trade in ships. Ship-owners and underwriters have learned in some instances to play games at which both are winners. The spectators have to put up the money. Here is what the Brit-ish Merchant Servise Journal says upon this subject: "The depatch of unseaworthy and overladen vessels, the confidence trick, and the grinding down of salaries puid to those who navigate the modern ship denote the fact that there are persons man-aging shipping matters whose greed causes them to ignore the safety of their servants' lives, and to show no con-sideration for public interests. The aim

sideration for public interests. The aim of the manager is to secure masters and officers at the lowest salaries. His vessels officers at the lowest salaries. His vessels are well covered by insurance, even to the most trifling damage; hence skilful navi-gators are not sought after, and the man-ning and officering of the mercantile marine is effected by the employment of those who are willing to risk, in addition to their own lives, the money of their friends. No matter how many lives may be lost by a casualty, the company has not to pay com-pensation: the shareholders receive their dividend and the shipbuilder an order to fill up the vacancy in the joint stock fleet. higher. dividend and the shipbuilder an order to fill up the vacancy in the joint stock fleet.
