

THE HUDSON BAY RAILWAY

GOVERNMENT NOT COMMITTED TO ITS CONSTRUCTION.

The Papers in the Matter Presented to Parliament-A Loan Was Promised But a Change of Contractors Was Made and the Government Will Not Recog-

Ottawa, May 3.—The long-expected papers in connection with the Hudson Bay Railway were presented to Parliament to-day. They extend over a period from May, 1891, up to the present time, On Oct. 23 last Mr. Hugh Sutherland wrote to Mr. Daly, pointing out difficulties which the company had met with in the money markets, and representing that the company could commence the construction with a temporary loan of \$6000 per mile. On Nov. 12 following Mr. Sutherland wrote Mr. Haggart requesting a straight loan of \$2,500,000 to enable the company to construct the road. Then follow a lot of papers indicating what the company had been doing during the past few years.

A Contract Entered Into. A Contract Entered Into.

On May 12, 1891, a contract was entered into between the company on one part and James Ross, Montreal; Donald D. Mann, Winnipeg; H. B. Holt, Montreal, and William McKenzie, Toronto, for the construction of the line, provided the necessary financialarrangements were made. H. D. Lumsden of Toronto was to be the company's engineer, and the contractors were to build the railway from the end of the 40 miles already constructed. ble, isn't it?"


