We are sorry to hear that little Dorothy Barteaux has scarlet fever. It is to be hoped that this dread disease won't spread.

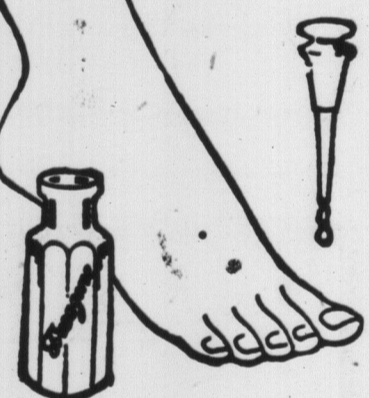

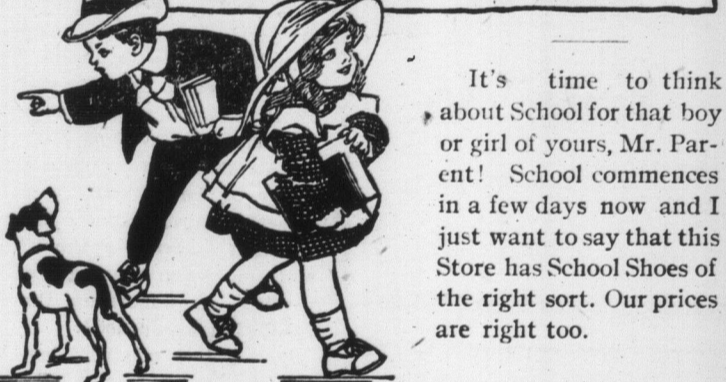
