Yet to become a Christian means to leave home and loved ones, and that she feels she can not do. We feel that if she is worshipping God aright He will provide a way for her to leave all and follow Him, and are therefore hoping that the day is not far distant when she will come out boldly on the Lord's side.

We have access to a large number of houses in the native part of Cantonment. This no doubt is owing to our school and the fact that most of the young women with whom we come in contact have attended Mrs. Goffin's (a London Missionary) school. We find it a great advantage to meet with women who can read. They of course are more intelligent in every way. When we find a woman who can read, we give her a New Testament, a portion of which she is to read over carefully as often as she can till we come again. This rule we find works real well. We believe that the day for Salvation of some of these women among whom we are now working is coming, and it makes our hearts rejoice. Pray for us.
