PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO.

The Presbytery of Toronto, of the United Presbyterian Church, met on the 34 February, and was constituted by the Rev. Mr. Coutts, moderator, p. l. The committee appointed to superintend the students reported, that they had, on the 16th December, examined Mr. McDonald on part of the exercises previously assigned him by the Presbytery, and had sustained and approved of the whole. The Presbytery received and adopted the report of the committee. They then examined Mr. McDonald on sur report of the commutee. Assigned Mr. McDonald exercises for the next three months, to be prepared for the committee and Presbytery. Appointed the Rev. Mr. Jennings moderator for the current year. pointed the next meeting to be held on the 6th of April, at two o'clock p. m., in the United Presbyterian Church, Toronto.
