

and retail positions of various types, both part-time and full time, appear to be readily available in the community. Compensation for part-time work is normally based on the minimum wage.

The general consensus of opinion appears that those jobs requiring advanced degrees, specialized training, or registration and/or licensing are more difficult to find but they do exist. However, it should be remembered that one will be competing with Americans with professional qualifications. It may be necessary to wait or to take a job at a lower level temporarily.

A job-seeker should utilize the services of a professional placement agency as well as diplomatic and community contacts.

If and when a job interview takes place, one should be prepared for some lack of understanding about the Reciprocal Employment Agreement. It is advisable to obtain a "letter of introduction" from the Personnel Department which will frequently clear up any misunderstanding. If that does not work, do not get frustrated. Call Personnel.
