LABOUR CONDITIONS

LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE—EFFECT ON FEED GRAIN SUPPLIES

Mr. Adrien Lambert (Bellechasse): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 26, I should like to present a motion for the discussion of a specific matter of importance and extreme urgency.

Mr. Speaker, I maintain that the House must study, in all haste, the present work stoppages which are paralyzing the ports of Montreal, Trois-Rivières and Quebec City, and are preventing the millers from getting feed grain supplies intended for cattle, thus threatening the lives of thousands of them, which will result in food product losses on the one hand and income losses for the farm producers on the other.

In spite of the injunction in the port of Quebec City, which is not the case with the ports of Montreal and Trois-Rivières, customers from those two cities have been forced to go to Quebec City for their supplies but reserves there will last no longer than a couple of days at the most. Public interest therefore demands that Parliament intervene immediately; to that effect, I move:

That this House do now adjourn.

Mr. Speaker: Order. I did receive notice of motion on this subject, pursuant to Standing Order 26, from the hon. member for Joliette (Mr. La Salle). It might perhaps be preferable to listen to him now before reaching a decision.

Mr. Roch La Salle (Joliette): Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to see that some hon. members are interested in the problems of Quebec.

In view of the alarming situation the Quebec producers are in, I feel compelled to rise under the provisions of Standing Order 26 to put forward a motion to discuss a serious and urgent matter, that is the longshoremen's strike in the harbours of Trois-Rivières, Montreal and Quebec City, which has the effect of jeopardizing the feed supply and even in some instances of fully disrupting this supply required by Quebec farm producers who are thus forced to take prematurely their cattle and poultry to the slaughterhouse. I therefore propose:

That this House do now adjourn.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. It is the second time I am submitted a notice of a motion on the same subject pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 26. Last Wednesday, the hon. member for Bellechasse (Mr. Lambert) gave the Chair notice of a motion pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 26. I did not accept the motion last week, but I stated that it might be advisable to delay the matter
