## QUEEN'S WILL SEND ENGINEER CORPS

Prof. MacPhail Recruiting Them — To Be Ready on Short Notice.

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 10.—Professor Alexander MacPhail, M. L. A., is called home from Prince Edward Island to recruit his corps of Canadian engineers associated with the school of mining at Queen's University. He is calling the students by telegram and expects to have a large contingent ready to go to the front on very short notice. In addition to the military training they are trained as a department in engineering work.

Come as Medical Students or Teachers—Several Leave Kingston.

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 10.—Professor J. N. Landon, of the Royal Military College, believes that Germany has spies all over the world. They come out in the guise of teachers and medical students. In Kingston a number of them have been closely watched and several have quietly got out of town.

MONTENEGRIN PORT WAS BOMBARDED  
Austrian Warships Also Fired on Hills Where Citizens Took Refuge.

BARI, Italy, August 10.—After the Austrian cruisers had bombarded Antivari, Montenegro, damaging the wireless station and the electric works, they directed their fire to the adjacent hills in which many Montenegrins from the town had sought refuge.

These refugees returned the fire whereupon the cruisers redoubled their attack upon the town and its suburbs, destroying many houses. One cruiser then entered the port and resumed the bombardment, destroyed the maritime station and storehouses. The warships then sailed in the direction of Cattaro, Austria.

SPIRITUOUS LIQUORS  
ADVANCE IN PRICE

MONTREAL, Aug. 10.—War prices went into effect this morning on all spirituous liquors and struck a hard blow to the many patrons. Beers and ale alone were retailed at the old price.

It was in whiskies, brandies, gins of all kinds that the change was felt. Certain drinks have been practically eliminated, the many brands which retailed at ten cents being now fifteen cents or two for a quarter, and in some places fifteen cents straight. On the more expensive brands, which retailed at fifteen cents, there has been an increase also of five cents.

## FOUND DYNAMITE ON KINGSTON ROAD

Scarboro German's Defence—Was Remanded in County Court.

Henry Gercke, the German, who was arrested by County Constables Robert Burns and Jack Brown on a charge of having a quantity of dynamite stored in his premises at Scarboro Junction for an unlawful object, appeared before Magistrate Clay in the county police court yesterday. He was remanded for a week without bail.

W. G. Thurston, who represented the crown, asked that this be done, as he wished to consult with the militia. He was not prepared to say whether the case was one for court-martial or not.

In response to questions Gercke said that he had been in Canada about two years, had never served in the German army, and that he found the case of dynamite on the Kingston road about a year ago.

Gercke, who is a Canadian, stated yesterday that when the box was found on the Kingston road they thought it contained provisions for her husband carried it home. He later tried to dispose of it to the Rice-Lewis Co., but they did not want any dynamite and it was stored in the woodshed.

Has a Factory.  
Gercke says that he has a factory at Scarboro Junction, where he makes asbestos and artificial wood floorings. There is only one firm in Toronto that sells dynamite—Canadian Explosives, Ltd. Their magazine is at Agincourt, and the manager of the company stated that a fifty pound case is the smallest quantity they sell.

Swansea Man Injured BY LAKE SHORE RD. CAR  
Thomas Mayho Run Down While Returning From His Work Yesterday.

Thomas Mayho, residing with his son-in-law, Mr. Abbott, at 22 Bertha street, Swansea, was run down and seriously injured yesterday morning by a radial car near the car barns on the Lake Shore road between stops 2 and 3. Mr. Mayho was a night watchman on the good roads work of the highway commission, and had just ceased his duties when the accident occurred. He had been on duty for several hours when a car going citywards came upon him unobserved, throwing him down and dragging him several yards.

Badly injured.  
When picked up Mr. Mayho was found to be suffering from a broken leg, a severe scalp wound, and injury to his shoulder.

W. Wager of St. John's Ambulance Corps, also employed on the good roads work, rendered first aid, and later Dr. Forbes Godfrey attended the injured man, and had him removed to the West-ern Hospital.

Just Little Over Eighteen Mills This Year — Contracts Awarded.

The total general tax rate for the year was fixed last night by the New Toronto village council at 18.1 mills.

The rate last year was 24 mills, but notwithstanding the great expense being entailed in the installation of a water service, the fact that this year the assessment was about doubled rendered the low rate fixed practicable.

A special meeting of the council will be held tomorrow night at 8 in the school hall for the letting of the contract for the filtration and pumping plants. This is the last contract in connection with the new water system to be let.

SCARBORO RATE STRUCK BY COUNCIL YESTERDAY  
Township Three and a Half, and County Three Mills—Barn Burned.

Yesterday the Scarboro Township Council struck the township tax rate at 3 1/4 mills, and the county rate at 3 1/2 mills. The total assessment of the township this year is \$5,747,123, an increase over last year of \$500,000. For general purposes was fixed at \$12,243, and county expenditure at \$11,000.

"A laborer's wife purchased 40 lbs. of butter, 1 sack of flour and one sack of sugar. There is no principle or patriotism among the firms that sell such large quantities to individual families."
