CANADIAN TROOPS TO HAVE CANTEEN

Imperial Authorities Decide to Set One Up on Salisbury Plains.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON. Oct. 22. - Col. Sam Hughes, Canadian minister of militia, when seen today on the subject of the establishment of a canteen at Salisbury, was not disposed to say very much. "Permanent forces in Canada," be said, "have their canteens and they well looked after."

Another officer, now commandin as important section of the contingent when seen pointed out that a canteen in lines would tend to have the sale intoxicants under thoro control. "Salisbury Plain," he said, "is dotted all over with small liquor houses,

and all over with small liquor houses, and on Sunday, for instance, one can get supplied at these practically any hour, seeing that a three-mile walk takes them within the Travelers' Licensing Act, whereas if a canteen is established in the camp, men are restricted to one pint of beer daily each, and there is no treating. CANAL PATROL OFFICERS.


