

### SHAKE-UP MADE IN ONTARIO CABINET

Hon. I. B. Lucas Succeeds Hon. J. J. Foy as Attorney-General.

### ELEVENTH HOUR CHANGE

Hon. G. H. Ferguson and Hon. T. W. McGarry Are New Members.

Prime minister and president of executive council—Hon. W. H. Laurier. Attorney-general—Hon. I. B. Lucas. Minister of education—Hon. Dr. Fyfe. Provincial secretary—Hon. W. J. Hanna. Minister of agriculture—Hon. James Duff. Minister of public works—Hon. Mackenzie Bowden. Minister of lands, forests and mines—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson. Provincial treasurer—Hon. T. W. McGarry.

Without portfolio—Hon. J. J. Foy and Hon. E. F. Preston. The Ontario Cabinet is now made over and stands complete for the business of the session. Hon. I. B. Lucas becomes attorney-general, with Thomas McGarry assuming the duties of provincial treasurer and Howard Ferguson of Grenville taking the portfolio of lands, forests and mines.

It is generally understood that a complete change of plans occurred in the cabinet at the eleventh hour. There had been a tacit understanding among all the ministers, including those most interested, that Mr. Hanna would assume control in Mr. Foy's absence. Seniority of service and the recognized ability of the attorney-general's office aided in this belief.

Up to 10 o'clock on Tuesday morning this impression prevailed, and then followed the decision of the announcement was made, and Lieut.-Governor Hendrie summoned for the swearing in ceremony.

The two new men in the cabinet come from eastern Ontario and both show a record of service to the government. In debating on the floor of the house and in the committee work which has featured the last two sessions both bore prominent parts, and their accession to portfolios has been expected. The two "unattached" members will be Hon. Mr. Foy and Hon. Dr. Preston.

Public attention will focus on the new attorney-general because of the several outstanding matters demanding consideration. Counties along the shore of Lake Huron are appealing for assistance from this department in connection with the Moyes railway fiasco, and other matters of importance will confront Mr. Lucas as he steps into the office.

Mr. Jamieson is perhaps the most senior member in the Ontario House. His knowledge of parliamentary procedure and the fidelity of his service made the likelihood of his appointment as speaker certain some time ago.

### CAPTURE HOUSEBREAKERS FIND BOOT UNDER BED

Four Arrests May Clear Up Series of Burglaries Reported.

Four young men, suspected of having perpetrated numerous burglaries, were arrested by Detective Guthrie and Acting Detectives Holmes, Stewart and Nichols in a rooming house at 255 Manning avenue at noon yesterday. In an old valise hidden underneath the bed, the officers found nearly \$600 worth of jewelry and clothing, which have been identified as stolen from houses in different sections of the city. Those under arrest are Frank Andrews, age 21; Reuben Costello, age 24; William and Bert Hoban, aged 20 and 23.

The police believe the men are merely part of an organized gang who have been operating in Toronto for some months. Other arrests may follow. In a stable at the rear of the rooming house where the men were arrested the detectives found a horse and pig which fits the description of one which it is thought has been used for trips to the country for purposes of chicken thieving. The officers could find no traces of any poultry stolen from farmers, however.

### CITY STILL AT OUTS WITH PROV. HYDRO

New Rates Only Emphasize Fact That Toronto "Disobeyed" Order.

The new schedule of hydro-electric rates which was given out yesterday at the city hall is understood to be little favored by the provincial commission. No expression of opinion could be gained last evening from Sir Adam Beane, but the proposed schedule, not being in conformity with the commission's orders, is likely to be taken as an attempt at compromise, coming a year late, and not following the spirit of the recommendations.

A study of the new rates suggested under the schedule Toronto would stand apart from the method of rating now prevailing throughout the province. As far as the original difference was concerned the situation stands unchanged.

The commission recommended, and then ordered, certain reductions for Toronto. These orders were not obeyed, and from the provincial viewpoint the arrangement of the new schedule does not overcome the difficulty. The whole matter will come before a meeting of the commission at an early date.

### BIG PROFIT SHOWN BY EXHIBITION

Management Hands City More Than Twenty-Seven Thousand Dollars.

### PAY BILLS FOR WIRING

Tenders for Rosedale Section of Bloor Street Viaduct Are Received.

"When the Exhibition opened we anticipated a deficit," said Mayor Hocken at the board of control, yesterday morning when ex-Mayor Joseph Oliver handed the members two cheques for a total of \$27,573, representing the profits from the Exhibition. "That profit is returned as a surplus for the management of the Exhibition." "It is an agreeable surprise for the taxpayers," added Controller McCarthy.

The board recommended that a three-year old debt of \$71,000, representing the cost of wiring the city's buildings at the Exhibition when the city replaced the Toronto Electric Globe by the new one, be paid in next year's estimates for payment.

Controller McCarthy was averse to loading up next year's estimates with such a big sum without more detailed information, which Mr. Cousins of the hydro commission supplied. "Now, there are no more of these old liabilities lying over," asked he of the mayor.

"Everything has been cleaned up this year," was the reply. "You can start in next year with a clean sheet and without owing the banks \$13,000,000."

The mayor opened seven tenders for the Rosedale section of the Bloor street viaduct, which was for concrete. The following are the sealed tenders on the second section of the structure:

Tender No. 1, \$312,453; tender No. 2, \$351,512; tender No. 3, \$371,013; tender No. 4, \$417,947; tender No. 5, \$384,662; tender No. 6, \$476,871. The single concrete tender was for \$310,553.

The tenders and specifications were turned over to commissioner Harris for consideration.

### WILLISON PRESIDES OVER NEW COMMISSION

Provincial Government Appoints Men to Study Unemployment Problem.

Hon. W. J. Hanna announced yesterday the personnel of a new provincial commission to investigate the unemployment problem in all parts of Ontario. The commission is given full power to examine the causes of the unemployment problem with a view to alleviating a serious situation.

Sir John Willison will be chairman. The other members under Mr. Hanna, McNeill, Archdeacon Cody, Rev. Daniel Strachan, W. K. McNaught, Joseph P. Bell, Fred. D. Dery, Dr. J. G. Gilbert Jackson, W. E. Gundy and W. L. Best of Ottawa.

### W. G. JAFFRAY SUCCEEDS TO GLOBE PRESIDENCY

Son of Late Senator Says Newspaper Will Not Change Policy.

W. G. Jaffray was elected president of the Globe Printing Company by a unanimous vote of the board of the Globe yesterday, thus succeeding to the position held by his father, the late Senator Jaffray. In a brief address to the board, consisting of 41 directors, Mr. Jaffray said that he, C. G. Tower Ferguson and P. C. Larkin, the new president declared his intention to continue the policy of the Globe in the past. He said he would seek not only the interests of the shareholders, but give what service he could to the country first and to the Liberal party.

### BURNED TO DEATH IN FIRE RESCUE

Farm House at Sydenham, Near Kingston, Was Destroyed.

### STARTED FROM A STOVE

William Deyo is Dead and His Sister-in-Law Sustains Terrible Burns.

Special to The Toronto World. KINGSTON, Dec. 22.—One man burned to death, giving up his life to save another, and a woman so badly burned that she will not recover, is the sad tale of a fire which occurred in the Village of Sydenham, 18 miles from Kingston, this morning. Alfred Deyo, 27 years of age, lost his life and the life of his sister-in-law, Mrs. William Deyo, hangs in the balance.

Mrs. Deyo's husband met a sudden death a few weeks ago, when he fell into an open shaft at Sydenham. Those in the house were her husband's brother, Mrs. Deyo's sister, and the hired man. This morning at 8 o'clock, while Deyo was out in the barn, the hired man started a fire in the kitchen stove before the two women were out of bed. After lighting the fire the hired man went to the barn, but he had only been gone a few minutes when the heat of the stove ignited the kitchen. Mrs. Deyo's sister ran out to give the alarm. Deyo and the hired man rushed back to the house, and by this time the flames were making rapid headway. Deyo succeeded in finding his way upstairs to his sister-in-law's room, and carried her to the bottom of the stairs. Here he was overcome by smoke and fell senseless to the floor with his burden. Fearing for the safety of the two, the hired man made his way into the burning house. He stumbled over the body of Mrs. Deyo, but he got no trace of Mr. Deyo. He succeeded in getting Mrs. Deyo out, but she was terribly burned. The little home was totally destroyed with all the furniture. The charred body of Deyo was found in the debris by searchers.

### CHRISTMAS SPIRIT RULING AT CAMP

Leave-Colled Many Canadians—Col. Williams Returns From Front.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, Dec. 22.—Preparations for celebrating Christmas are in full swing among the Canadians at Salisbury. A good many will celebrate it by putting many miles between themselves and the camp, about eight thousand having obtained leave, varying from three to seven days, according to the distance they intend traveling. Several thousand more will get a day of leave.

A bright day with plenty of agreeable incidents is promised for those who remain. Church parades will be held; also celebrations of Holy Communion. Evening smoking concerts have been arranged by the men themselves. Each battalion has been given carte blanche to provide a dinner according to its own taste and fancy. The second battalion has secured several barrels of Canadian apples.

Colonel in Trenches. Fifty men from the 17th Nova Scotia Bn. have been transferred to the Princess Pats. Col. Williams has returned from the front, where he spent three weeks studying conditions. He was three days and nights in the trenches. On returning to Salisbury he delivered several lectures to officers at Buntingford. Col. Williams has sought to make it specially known that there is no place for a man at the front of intemperate habits. Men have been shot for being found drunk on duty.

Mrs. Vaughan, wife of General Vaughan, now at the front, has been untried in behalf of the 550 Canadians now in hospital at Buxford, having given up her beautiful house in the neighborhood for convalescents. Christmas presents by the thousands are arriving for the Canadians.
