PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—Florence McLaughlin, the local eleven-year-old girl swimming marvel, who created a sensation last summer by covering ten miles in a continuous swim, is aiming at big game this season.

She proposes to attempt no less a feat than the 15½-mile water trip between Chester and her home city in the Delaware River, a task at which had failed many a crack man swimmer. More, she intends to leave no doubts in the public mind, if she succeeds, by making the trip competitive.

She has induced her trainer and coach, Sgt. Rodman of the local police, to arrange an invitation race over the long course, and several of the leading mermen of New York will have their expenses paid if they consent to meet the child wonder in the contest.

Sgt. Rodman is confident that the plucky Florence will complete the grueling journey, provided conditions are favorable. He points out that she has grown stronger, speedier and more enduring since she made her ten-mile swim last year.

Also, that after that great performance she was submitted to a medical examination and found not one whit affected by the work done. He says her magnificent constitution, and the practically effortless stroke she uses, make swimming a pleasant, unstraining exercise to her.

## Well Known Horseman Joins Silent Majority

George May, one of the best-known of the oldest of Canadian horsemen, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Conway, 45 Constance street, this city, on Friday last. He was well past the allotted span of man, being in his 84th year. He was born at St. Catharines, and would have been 54 had he lived till Aug. 23. Early in life he developed a fondness for the horse, and was actively engaged in the horse business in many different forms up till the last few years. He owned and ran a very large livery in St. Catharines for over twenty years, and was never without a trotter for his own use and to race a bit. He was a well-known driver, and owned some good ones. Many of the horsemen will remember George May and Paddy. He drove Paddy in 43 races, and was only beaten three times.

The late Mr. May also used to drive Paddy and Alexander, his mate, to pole, and many hard-fought races were driven by him with this pair at the Toronto Exhibition when team racing was one of the attractions. He drove them against a team owned by the late C. J. Hamilton, Belle Hamlin and Justina, at a meeting at Buffalo, and beat them. Some years ago, when he was 78, he was one of the drivers of the horses held by the two driving clubs of Toronto, and was always selected as a timer. He preferred that to acting as judge. He was very accurate in timing.

On the 3rd of the present month, although far from well, he managed to get over to the track and timed for the Dufferin Driving Club, but he was never out of the house again. He will be greatly missed by his host of friends who are devotees of the harness horse. He was also a rider of the thoroughbred as well, and for many years was the principal jockey of the Gates & Littlefield stables, and rode in many plate races when they were run at different points thru the province.

## BOB HENSLEY WINS HOTEL HANDICAP

Slipper Day Lands Canadian Feature—Great Crowd Second Day at Hamilton.

HAMILTON, June 26.—Bob Hensley, a recent arrival from Kentucky, won the Hotel Royal Handicap, the feature race of today's offering by the Hamilton Jockey Club. He made all of his own pace and had plenty in reserve at the finish. King Hamburg was second and Celso third. Pandean, the Thompson representative, sulked, and was never a factor.

Apart from the stake, additional features were the Dundas Steeplechase and Oakville Handicap. Stucco accounted for the jumping race, while Slipper Day galloped home with a commanding lead in the Oakville. A tremendous gathering was present to witness the sport, the Toronto delegation coming in three special trains.

## ALL AUTOMOBILE RECORDS BROKEN

D. Resto, the Winner, and Nine Others Ahead of the Old Speed Marks.

CHICAGO, June 26.—All competitive speedway automobile records of the world from fifty miles to 500 were shattered in the running of the first Chicago 500-mile Derby.

The previous record, made by Dario Resta, who won with a French car, and captured more than \$20,000 in prize money, but by the nine other drivers who finished in the money. Resta's official time was 5:07.28.

The previous record, made by Ralph DePalma at Indianapolis recently, was at the rate of 59.34 miles per hour. Resta averaged 57.6 over the same distance, and J. Cooper, who finished tenth, bettered the DePalma mark, averaging 50.3 miles. Eighty thousand persons witnessed the race.

The veteran Harry Grant drove the entire race without a stop and finished in fifth position, averaging 55.06 miles an hour. The previous non-stop record of 53.05 miles was held by Cooper, who finished tenth, bettered the DePalma mark, averaging 50.3 miles. Eighty thousand persons witnessed the race.
