This vessel scarcely could have been the Ramazan, however, for the Frankfort paper said the vessel question was a 15,000 ton steamer hich had been sunk in the Mediterranean off the Island of Crete. The Ramazan evidently was carry ing Indian troops either to the Gallipoli Peninsula or to France. The course taken might have been thru the Arabian Sea, the Gulf of Aden, the Red Sea and the Suez Canal into the Mediterranean. The fact that the survivors were landed at Athens
