TWO INCENDIARY FIRES

Fireman Injured by Falling Timber, and Five Horses Crumpled. LONDON, Ont., Dec. 5.—(Special.)—Two fires in hotel stables, both believed to be of incendiary origin, took place here this evening. The first, in the Windsor Hotel stables, resulted in a loss of \$1600 and threatened the whole block of buildings. In this fire Fireman Frank Gleason was severely injured by falling timber and taken to Victoria Hospital.

The second fire, at the Harrison House, less than 100 yards away, resulted in five horses being destroyed.
