

## WILSON AND MORDEN TO APPEAR NEXT WEEK

Adjournment Made Until March 3  
— Keeley Mine Sues  
Farmers' Bank.

Matthew Wilson, K.C., and C. S. Morden, assistant manager of the Trusts & Guarantee Co., were arraigned in police court yesterday morning, charged with conspiring with W. H. Travers to procure him to give the company a fraudulent preference over the other creditors of the Farmers' Bank in the matter of an alleged consolidation of \$175,000 loan and a \$120,000 unsecured deposit. Both pleaded not guilty, and the case was adjourned until March 3, when a day will be set for the trial, so that, in the event of a conviction, the matter will be ready for the grand jury of the sessions, which meets in a week.

An action has been begun by the shareholders of the Keeley Mines, Limited, by permission of the referee, against the Farmers' Bank for an accounting of the matter between them. The shareholders allege that the indebtedness to the bank is not nearly so large as announced by the liquidator, and they declare that the transfer of the bonds of the mine was not sanctioned by the directors, and that it is therefore void.

## PATRIOTISM, NOT PARTY

Col. Denison's Views on Reciprocity Cheered at G. B. G. Dinner.

Enthusiastic patriotism was in the air at the banquet of the Governor-General's Body Guard dinner in the St. Charles last night, when songs and speeches of loyal sentiment were heard after cheer, and 150 lusty military throats can make a noise worth while at any time.

Col. Denison gave voice to his opinions on the proposed treaty in no uncertain terms. He instanced the reciprocity treaty between England and France during William Pitt's time, and which finally ended in a bitter war, because the French military was stronger, and the country was unable to break from the treaty. "And that is just trying to play Pitt's game on us," declared the colonel.

"It's not a question of party politics at all," he said, "we must club together on this thing, and put our country before our party. We would rather be a turncoat to my party than a traitor to my country, and why should we think of Liberal or Conservative when we have that before us which occupies the face of our country?" he finished, amid great applause.

Lieut.-Col. Mason said he could not imagine any loyal Canadian having any other view than that expressed by Col. Denison. "What would I care for a party," he asked, "if we could no more couple the names of Canada and the Empire?" Lieut.-Col. Dunn also addressed the gathering, speaking more on the questions of purely military interest. Messrs. D. Cowan, F. Buckley, George Kentwell and Lieut. Hunter provided the music.

## BETTER WATER IN SCHOOLS

Trustees Appoint Sub-Committee to Improve Present Conditions.

"It is absurd that when we do not allow our children to drink the 'city water at home,'" said Trustee Brown, the property committee of the board of education yesterday, "they should be allowed to drink it freely in the schools. Something should be done to avoid this."

The committee passed a resolution to the effect that the chairman of the committee, Trustee Hodgson, Superintendent of Buildings Bishop and Trustee Brown should be appointed to a sub-committee to provide good water at once and report the cost at a later date.

Rev. R. A. Bushell of St. Clement's church, representing ratepayers of his district, urged the necessity of the enlargement of Leslie-street school.

The matter was referred to the buildings committee.

The purchase of a lot 45 x 128, fronting on Hartlett-avenue and immediately to the north of the Davenport school at a cost of \$30 a foot, was recommended.

The superintendent of buildings reported that work is being done on two portable school rooms for Fern school and they will probably be ready for occupation on Monday, March 6th. The R. Laidlaw Co. have the contract.
